

#### FROM THE TREASURER



The organization's monetary position continues on a sound basis. Newsletter production and mailing costs will be covered with the usual financial resources available; there will be no extraordinary impact on our financial reserves.



Reunion activities in 2005 were financially successful; we ended up with an excess of a little over \$2000.00 from the convention/reunion, and close to \$1800.00 in PX/BX Sales, which reduces the investment in our inventory. Thanks to the outstanding work of our reunion hosts Gene and Irene Sheridan, the reunion was a brilliant success.

As usual, membership dues continue to be the main income source, with PX/BX sales (on a break-even basis), interest income from CD's, and donations also positively contributing. Major expenses continue to be the newsletter publication, production, and delivery, followed closely by recruitment expenses, reunion "seeding" and PX/BX inventory expenses. Our organization also contributed \$7,000.00 to the Air Force Aid Society in support of their work in the Biloxi area in support of Katrina efforts in 2005. A full financial report will be forthcoming at the 2006 convention/reunion and in the November 2006 AACS Communicator.

The PX/BX (some still call it PX or BX) sales continue to peak just prior to and after the fall reunion, and just after publication and delivery of the semi-annual AACS Communicator. Our source for windbreaker jackets has stopped manufacture of the item. We still have limited amounts of small and medium sizes available, but large and extra large are out of stock and will not be replaced. Windbreaker Quantities:





# A Routine Day For Controllers?

BIEN HOA—Air traffic controllers in the control tower at Bien Hoa AB recently handled 12 emergency landings in a single day but modestly termed it as "routine."

The morning shift, headed by TSgt. Carl R. Johnson, Washington Depot, Conn., was confronted with five emergencies and all the aircraft were brought in without in-

cident. The afternoon shift, led by TSgt. Robert R. Myers, Ferguson, Mo., "talked" in seven pilots faced with emergencies.

Tower operators, assigned to the 1977th Communications Squadron, normally handle three to four emergencies and control an average of 480 aircraft movements during their six hour shifts.

Other members working the "routine" day were Staff Sergeants Richard R. Lee, San Barnardino, Calif., and Grover K. Eggleston, Medicine Park, Okla., and Sgt. Richard H. Wiegand, Braddock Heights, Md.

During 1968, Bien Hoa air traffic controllers handled more traffic than any other airport in the world. They controlled 857,-679 take-offs and landings during the record-setting year.

John Hays, 6810 SE Francis St, Hillsboro, OR 97123-6423 Claims that he is the only AACS member who ever received orders via Western Union. He was stationed with the 1911-9 AACS Det out of Offutt AFB, Nebraska in 1951. He was pulling CQ one night in July 1951 when he received a call from Western Union that they had a telegram for the Commander. He asked the Western Union clerk to read the message. The message said "to alert S/Sgt John M. Hays for immediate overseas shipment".

Editors Note: John, you may not be the only one. In September 1951 I was home in Brooklyn, NY on Emergency leave from Munich Riem Airport, Germany for my Fathers death. While I was home, I received a Western Union telegram canceling my assignment to the 1860th AACS Mobile Comm Squadron at Munich Riem, and sending me PCS to the 1917th AACS Sq Westover AFB, Mass. Seems that I had reached my 36 months overseas and the new policy was to force mandatory curtailments of overseas tours if you had 36 or more months overseas. Think there may lots more, as in those days, using Western Union to reach military members at their home addresses was normal when they had official reasons to contact them.



As previously announced, the AACS Alumni Associations Membership Roster is on the Web Site (www.aacsalumni.com) in PDF a format ONLY. To ACCESS or DOWNLOAD the roster you need to know the following:

User Name: aacsalumni (all lower case letters)

Password: **m299kl7** (all lower case letters. Note that the next to last digit in the password is the lower case "L", NOT the number "1")

## REMEMBER TO PROTECT THE USER NAME AND PASSWORD AND DENY ACCESS TO UNAUTHORIZED PERSONNEL

Please note that to read or download a PDF FORMAT and you will need Adobe Reader to download it to your computer. If you do not have Adobe Reader, there is a link to Adobe.com so you can download a free copy to your computer. We felt that we can allow more members to read or download the membership roster using the PDF format as it is the "de-facto" internet standard and that the Adobe Reader program can be downloaded free to your computer.

## READ AND FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR DOWNLOADING. (Remember to RIGHT Click to get the "SAVE TO Menu")

Suggest before you start, you FIRST create a folder on your hard drive and name it "AACS Roster". When you are inputting the downloading instructions, name the file "AACS Roster" and then download to the AACS Roster folder you have created...this way, each time you download the roster, it will ask you if you want to replace the existing file....the answer is YES.. this will save disk space and only store the current roster on your computer.

YOU SHOULD BE ABLE VIEW THE ROSTER AND TO ENLARGE THE TEXT, YOU SHOULD GO TO VIEW ON THE TOOL BAR AND CHANGE THE SETTING TO 100%.

NOTE: THE MEMBERSHIP ROSTER ON THE AACS WEB SITE IS UPDATED APPROXIMATELY EVERY THREE (3) MONTHS. ALSO SEE THE NEW MEMBERS REPORT IN THE AACS COMMUNICATORS.






### Alan W. Gunsul, M.D. (ex SSGT Crypto Operator) Looks back

When his point total got high enough he was offered the chance to be discharged. Seven of the Sergeants in the Hq were all being sent home at the same time. They were offered instant promotion to MSgt if they extended for 6 months, and they all said NO...They only want to go home.

#### **AACS Convention/Reunion Sites**

All of our members should know that the AACS Reunion Committee (Stan Phillips, Bob Akard & Hank Sauer) have been tasked with the job to make recommendations to the Board of Directors (BOD) for our reunion sites each year. The BOD has the final approval/disapproval of a site/location for our annual reunions.

There is a formal process to make our reunions happen and they start as far ahead of the actual reunion as 2 to 3 years. We usually have a hotel contract in place no later than 18 months before the actual start date.

The Association policy is to try and hold the reunions in the different parts of the country each year (East, Central and West), to make travel times equal over a period of years for our members living in different sections of the country. This is not always possible, due to lack of qualified hosts or sites that do not meet our general requirements.

Some of the things that the Reunion Committee looks at in selecting a hotel/location are:

Air/Road Access, Airport shuttle/taxi costs, Hotel size of at least 300 or more rooms, banquet/meeting rooms to seat up to 400 people, room rates/taxes, hospitality rooms, lobby area size, our ability to negotiate room rates, comp rooms, etc., Local Restaurants, in-house dinning facilities, Local attractions within walking distance of the hotel and is the location a "travel destination", the number of members available to support a reunion host and a lot of other things.

As most members know, reunions just don't happen, it takes a lot of planning well in advance and in some cases a visit by one of the reunion committee members. What we need are members who want to host an annual convention/reunion to let us know well in advance, obtain a copy of the AACS Reunion Guide from the Executive Secretary and do some of the upfront things needed in selecting a hotel/site. The Reunion Committee, in the name of the Executive Director is responsible to negotiate the contract. The local AACS host will be part of the team in order to understand the terms and conditions of the contract.

We need members to step up to the plate early and help in the overall process of selecting and finalizing a convention/reunion site.

#### 14th AACS Sq - Belgian Congo Area

Art Masters reports that there are only six (6) of the original members still alive. The latest member to become a "silent key" and miss "Roll Call" was David Jenkins. The 14th AACS Sq went to the Congo to establish back-up lines of communications across south central Africa during WWII. The ages of those remaining are 93, 86 and number at 83. The 14th AACS Sq was deactivated and became the 19th AACS Sq when it was formed in Cairo, Egypt. Art located David in the early 50's and they both joined the AACS Alumni Association in 1982. Based on the ages of this initial group, attendance at our annual conventions/reunions has been curtailed for a number of years. We later members of the Alumni Association are proud to have known men like David and Art and honor them all for their service to our country.

#### **Templehof Airport to Close**

For all our members who served in Europe at Bases supporting the Berlin Airlift in the 1948-1949 time frame and for those of us who served at Templehof during and after the Airlift should know that it is scheduled to close in 2007.

Templehof was created by the "Third Reich" to "wow" visitors to the capital of Germania and Templehof was to be the statement of Nazi Germany greatness. It never happened of course, and Templehof went on to become the vital element of the massive Berlin Airlift and a symbol of West Berlin's ability to survive its isolation deep within Communist East Germany.



Christmas 1948 - Templehof AB, Germany.



#### **Dear Hank:**

I read the article on page 55 of the November 2006 AACS Communicator to Mac Maginnis from Jim Muse. Jim was wondering why there were no stories or photos from the 1950th AACS Sq at Wheelus AFB, Tripoli, Libya and you stated that you had not received any. Therefore, I thought lid write you.

I held a number of MOS's and AFSCís (760, 766, 29150, 29351 and 2937) and was assigned to the 1950th AACS Sq on February 2, 1949 from Frankfurt, Germany. I was a Buck Sgt at the time and was assigned as a high-speed radio operator. I remained at Wheelus until October 1950 when I was reassigned to the 1917th AACS Sq at Westover AFB, Mass for discharge.

Couple of things happened to me while I was stationed at Wheelus. I was working Air to Ground CW one evening about 10:30 pm when I heard an SOS from a C-54. I asked the C-54 what his problem was and he responded by telling me that he was somewhere over Europe and unsure of his position (during a thunderstorm). He requested a bearing. We had just activated a DF station but they could only receive calls from the radio shack. I advised the C-54 to transmit a signal and asked the DF station to see if they could get a fix on the C-54. They were able to use the ADF triangulation and reported that the C-54 was over Paris, France. They gave us a big thank you and headed toward Wiesbaden, Germany....

During my stay at Wheelus, we had a incident where there was unrest in the town of Tripoli and the town was placed off limits to all GI's. Most of the personnel on the Air Base were issued Carbines and ammo and we had 50 caliber machine guns mounted over the cab of the 6X6s. Nothing came of the local unrest while I was there and most everything went back to normal.

I was introduced 'Camel Steaks' while I was there and they were pretty good.


My remembrance of Libya was palm trees, heat and flies! Hope this letter will be seen by someone who was at Wheelus AFB during 1950-1951.







Two retired officers who were members of the legendary Tuskegee Airmen during World War II will give a program about their experiences at the Kansas City Public Library's Plaza Branch, 4801 Main Street, on Sunday, February 18

During the hour-long program, Major Harvey A. Bayless (ret.) and Major Harvey L. McCormick (ret.) will discuss their backgrounds as well as life after their experience as Airmen. A 20 minute documentary narrated by actor James Earl Jones about the difficulties black pilots faced in the military also will be shown. In addition, Bayless and McCormick will open the floor to questions.

Bayless, who serves as a historian for the Heart of America Chapter of the Tuskegee Airmen, Inc., was one of the original Airmen. A communications officer with the 96th and 523rd Air Service Groups, he provided services to the 332nd Fighter Group in the Italian Campaign during World War II. Bayless is a graduate of Syracuse University and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. He is the president of HB Engineering Company, providing technical consulting services to a number of corporations in the design of clean agent fire suppression

McCormick has dedicated his life to public service. After attending Texas College, he was drafted into the U.S. military at the start of World War II. Upon graduating from the Officers Candidate School, McCormick was commissioned a second Lieutenant and served as a supply officer at the Tuskegee Airbase from 1944-1946. After being discharged from the Air Force, McCormick graduated from the Marquette University Law School. He taught law in North Carolina and practiced law in Wisconsin before serving as an administrative law judge for the Social Security Administration. Currently, McCormick is a writer for West Publishing, covering the fields of Social Security and Medicare.

#### "THE ACTIVE DUTY AIR FORCE PAGE"

"Background"

In 2004, the AACS Alumni Association unanimously voted to change our Constitution to authorize Air Force Communications, Information, Air Traffic Controllers and Support personnel (Officers, Airman and Civilians) who have served or are now serving in any Air Force Major Command (including Joint/Specified Commands).

The changes in eligibility were predicated on ensuring the perpetuity of the AACS Alumni Association as the growing age of the current 2,500 plus members is now over 74 years in age, with a significant number of them being WWII veterans. The age factor was a major concern in maintaining a viable Association for the long-term and to provide an Association such as ours, to those individuals now serving in the Air Force. #### 8th Air Force to become new cyber command



11/3/2006 - WASHINGTON (AFPN) -- During a media conference here Nov. 2, Secretary of the Air Force Michael W. Wynne said the 8th Air Force would become the new Air Force Cyberspace Command. "I am announcing the steps the Air Force is taking towards establishing an Air Force Cyberspace Command," the secretary said. "The new Cyberspace Command is designated as the 8th Air Force... under the leadership of (Lt. Gen. Robert J. "Bob" Elder Jr.) He will develop the

force by reaching across all Air Force commands to draw appropriate leaders and appropriate personnel." Secretary Wynne said the 67th Network Warfare Wing, now under 8th Air Force, and other elements already within the 8th, would provide "the center of mass" for the nascent Cyberspace Command. The secretary also said Air Combat Command, Air Force Space Command and Air Force Materiel Command are working to develop the new Cyberspace Command, while Air Force personnel specialists are working to develop educational plans and career paths for those Airmen that will work within the new command. "The aim is to develop a major command that stands alongside Air Force Space Command and Air Combat Command as the provider of forces that the President, combatant commanders and the American people can rely on for preserving the freedom of access and commerce, in air, space and now cyberspace," Secretary Wynne said. Air Force leaders will begin detailed planning for the new Cyberspace Command Nov. 16 at the Cyber Summit. During the summit, Air Force leaders will chart a way ahead for the Air Force's role in cyberspace, also called the cyber domain.

As reported earlier in an AACS Communicator, AFFSA has moved from Andrews AFB, Maryland to Oklahoma City, OK. This move was basically completed in the last months of 2006.







The Las Vegas Strip Trolley provides door-to-door Strip transportation to all the hotels from the Stratosphere Tower to Mandalay Bay. The fare is \$1.75 in exact change.





This will be the last chance to purchase this book and we recommend that if you do not have the book or you want to purchase an additional copy, this is the time to do it.



Dear Hank,

Thanks for calling me back yesterday. I am enclosing several photos taken while I was stationed with the 1945<sup>th</sup> AACS Sqdn at Rhein Main AFB Germany. Since you previously had duty at Group in Wiesbaden and Wing at Munich you are pretty familiar with the area. I have put the names on the reverse side of those whose names I remember. Feel free to use these in any format you deem acceptable.

I worked in Weather Communications, beginning as an operator in Feb 1951, Shift Chief (Charlie Shift) in 1952 and the Chief Operator (CHOP) in early 1953 until I rotated in Dec 1953. My last seven months were at the 1901<sup>st</sup> AACS Sqdn at Hamilton AFB in San Rafael Ca where I was discharged on July 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1954. I am also enclosing a copy of a duty roster (I was promoted at S/Sgt in Aug 1972 and was on waiting list for Tech when I rotated. (and lost my place on Sqdn list). We made the switch from American Teletypes to German Teletypes during 1953. Quite a difference!



# The Berlin Airlift, 1948-1949 (Submitted by Jim Davis)

During the spring of 1948 the 60th Troop Carrier Group moved from Munich/Reim Air Base to Kaufbeuren Air Base. Kaufbeuren is at the base of the Alps a few miles south of Augsburg. At the time I was an Operations Officer (1st Lt.) with duty at both Munich and Kaufbeuren. My oldest son, William III was born at the 98th General Hospital in Munich on the 29th of May, 1948. I had moved daughter, maid and household goods to Kaufbeuren the previous day. The new son and the two year old daughter, Ellyn, both had some physical problems so we had made the decision to send the family back to the States as soon as possible. My wife and two children left from Rhein/Main Air Base in Frankfurt on the 24th of June, 1948.

The 60th TCG had been sending as many as 3 C-47's to Rhein/Main each week for several weeks. The mission was hauling mail and cargo between Frankfurt and Berlin. The airfield at Berlin was Templehof. I hauled tombstones and baby grand pianos on occasion. Since my family was on the way home to Champaign, Illinois I volunteered to take the three airplanes to Frankfurt. Since the Airlift which was nicknamed "Operation Vittles" many people have referred to those early missions as "Little Vittles". We never referred to those missions in that manner. Someone dreamed that one up long after the fact.

After arrival at Rhein/Main my C-47 was loaded and I made a round-trip to Berlin. Back at Rhein/Main reloading and refueling was going slow and it was getting late in the afternoon so I went to Operations and advised that I wanted quarters for the crew and that we would depart at first light the next morning. Lt. Herschel Simmons was the Operations Officer on duty; he advised that I was to go to Berlin as soon as the airplane was ready. I refused on the basis that we were restricted from flying in the corridor to Berlin at night and we were forbidden to remain overnight in Berlin. He insisted that I go; I refused again. At that point a harsh voice said "Lieutenant!" I turned around to face Colonel Walter Lee, Commander of Rhein/Main, who said, "You get your butt out to that airplane and take it to Berlin tonight!!!" The obvious answer was, "Yes sir."

So off to Berlin at about 9pm. Upon arrival I announced that I needed quarters for the crew and would like to send an RON message to my home base. Instead I was directed to return to Frankfurt. My argument about regulations against flying in the corridor at night was useless. Off to Frankfurt. Nearing the Frankfurt Airport I requested approach clearance to Rhein/Main. "Surprise, you're being diverted to Wiesbaden Air Base." I protested that I didn't want to go to Wiesbaden as I was operating out of Rhein/Main. I was given approach instructions for Wiesbaden and told to report to my Group Commander upon arrival. I figured that everyone was irked because I had been somewhat obstinate about the whole drill. By the time I landed at Wiesbaden we had some low cloud and light drizzle. As I taxied in it became obvious that the entire 60th was at Wiesbaden. I checked into Operations and asked if our Group Commander, Colonel Bertram C. Harrison had an office there. He did, on the second floor.

I reported to him and he said, "Congratulations." I said, "For what, sir?" Harrison said, "You've flown the first mission for our Group on the Berlin Airlift." "Yes sir, if you say so." The Colonel replied, "You don't know what I'm talking about, do you!" "No sir." "Maybe you'd better tell me what you've been doing today?? So I gave him a blow by blow description. He asked, "Didn't they give you any kind of intelligence briefing about the closing of Berlin to all surface traffic and the threats to shoot down any planes in the corridor?" "No sir, not a word except GO!" With that Harrison called Walter Lee and called him everything except Colonel. He hung up, said "Congratulations again, let's get on with our job."

That's how it began for me. I had been scheduled to return to the States in August. That all went by the boards, of course. We started the operation with 48 C-47s in our Group and 48 in the 61st Troop Carrier Group at Rhein Main. In the 60th we had no pilots assigned strictly as pilots. Everyone had a staff job. They brought in staff pilots from various headquarters along with a lot of unhappy fighter pilots from all over Europe. Eventually all of the USAF effort was done with C-54s. The 60th began using C-54s in October.

I flew 198 trips while continuing with duties as an Operations Officer, Instructor Pilot and Instrument Examiner.

# A Tribute to Roy Leonard Lane, Lieutenant Colonel USAF, Retired (Korean War AACS Detachment Commander)

Our little detachment, Operating Location Eighteen, 1993<sup>rd</sup> AACS Squadron (Mobile) was commanded by First Lieutenant Roy Lane in 1953. Squadron Headquarters was at Kimpo ... the land of the Sabre. Our base, King One Eight, the land of the crash landing, is located just south of the 38<sup>th</sup> and was a "hot spot" during the war. The base is still operating and is the centerpiece of the ROK Air Force.

A few of us still communicate and cherish the memories from our "war" and our youth. Ray Buday, Ainsley Fullard-Leo, Emerson Whaley and I stay in touch. We also stay in touch with some of the Navy's FASRON-11 men. Some of us get together from time-to-time and raise a glass to those memories and the shadows therein.

We were all high-ranking control tower operators of the Airman Second Class variety. I look at the picture of the guys lined up on the catwalk in front of the tower cab ... smoking their "promotion day" cigars ... with a surge of fond memories still fresh in eye and mind.

Roy was exactly the kind of commander that a bunch of young control tower operators needed. When I recently read Jimmy Stewart's biography, <u>Jimmy Stewart, Bomber Pilot</u>, I thought of Roy. Descriptions of Stewart's style ... He was a real hero and a natural leader of men ... reminded me of Roy ... their leadership and guts quotient must have been closely matched.

Ainsley located Roy and his wife Colleen in 2004. They were living near Seymour-Johnson AFB in North Carolina. After several calls and conversations with Colleen we determined that Roy was ill with a pulmonary disease. Early on, I thought he might not have wished to talk with us; commanding teen-aged radio operators and maintenance men, control tower operators and all of the others associated with the unit must have been akin to "hauling cats" in a wheelbarrow.

I was much honored when in late May of 2005; Roy answered the phone. He sounded alert and well and we talked until my cell battery faded. We exchanged stories, answered questions and talked of getting together after his planned trip to Charleston, WV-Roy's home town. And then word was received of Roy's passing on July 4, 2005. With his date of birth being July 5, 1925 ... he wrapped everything up neatly as was his style.

Much of our conversation centered on an incident contrived by Ainsley and Ray. It seems that a ROKAF F-51 bounced on landing runway 25 and skidded left between the tower and FASRON-11's tin hut. When the aircraft passed the tower, Ainsley claims, he and the pilot were eye-to-eye and about 20 feet apart. The plane's wings were then vertical ... A 90-degree right bank as it were. The wings were back to level when the ship's left wing struck the "Love Charlie" radio beacon antenna ... a section of the wing dropped on one of AACS's luxurious tents in our compound.

Well, Lieutenant Lane then called for volunteers to make emergency repairs to the antenna ... he chuckled when he said; "I didn't get any and had to climb the 120-foot tower and make the repairs myself." We talked of Panthers, Corsairs, Skyraiders and C-47's ... we talked of the food, the cold, the heat, the fog and the rain ... and then the conversation was over.

I could go on and on about our little hideaway on the east coast of the Korean Peninsula and near to Task Force 77 and our comrades-in-arms on the Eastern Sea ... but for now I'll stand alone here in Virginia ... the house is empty ... I can't see the wrinkles ... and stand at a semblance of attention and render a hand salute to Roy Leonard Lane ... and I'll hold back the tears ... out of respect for Roy and his command ... if I can ...

Dear Mr. Sauer,

I enlisted in the Army Air Corps in December 1942, and was discharged in February 1946. After taking Radio Operator and Mechanic and Advanced Radio Mechanic courses at Scott Field, IL, I deployed October 1944, to the Pacific Theater, as a fledgling Army Airways Communication System radio mechanic. I never got to operate, repair or even see a radio for the rest of my military career.

I spent part of the deployment in New Guinea and part in the Philippine Islands. The stay in New Guinea was at Hollandia, owned then by the Netherlands East Indies. Hollandia is now called Jayapura and owned by Indonesia. Our camp was inland from the harbor at Hollandia, about 15 miles, near the air base and quite close to Lake Sentani. At first, we had crude quarters, but that was temporary. Later we moved to new, rather good looking facilities "up the road".

The AACS unit was the 143rd Squadron, 68th Group. It was, I have learned, a personnel replacement depot, as well as a communication station. I was never informed of our actual mission or purpose there. The photographs enclosed, which I took over 60 years ago, show both the original, temporary camp, as well as, the new, permanent facilities. I think you can tell the difference.



### **AACS Ring Project**

Ed Schmidt of Citrus Heights, California submitted a proposal to the Board of Directors recommending that the AACS Alumni Association look into placing quality AACS rings into our PX/BX inventory. Stan Phillips and Ray Sharpless were appointed to head up the AACS Ring Project Committee and make a recommendation to the Board.

They started searching the internet for "Military Rings" and related information. They found many vendors, providing a broad variety of metals, designs, and prices, for all of the major branches of the military. The majority of the rings offered were "generic", i.e. U.S. Air Force; U.S. Army; etc. They found a few companies that provided the option to "customize and "build your own" type ring, by means of providing a variety official military images and insignia, to select from. Stan Phillips chose to create and purchase his own "personalized" AACS Ring from Beeman Jewelers, at w, a vendor for Balfour Rings.

The basic ring is "college-like", in appearance, with a stone on top, surrounded by an inscription and inscribed panels and raised letters, on each side.

The ring is made of: 14k yellow gold; with an Air Force Falcon design, which "sits" under the "Fireflare" cut birthstone; surrounded with the inscription AACS Alumni Association. On side panel 1: is the "Air Traffic Controllers" badge/insignia; "USAF" below that; and "GCA", in raised letters, above. On side panel 2: is the Air Force logo (folded Cpl stripes); "USAF" below that; and "AACS, in raised letters, above. The inside of the ring was inscribed: "Servitio Dedicati". The cost of the ring was \$659.00.

Other metals available were: silver or gold Valadium; sterling silver; 10k or 18k yellow or white gold; ranging in price from \$130.00 to \$760.00, based on "current" market value, using the same design format, as described above.


Customized rings, for other "disciplines", within the AACS Community, can be created, using available images/insignia, for: Communications/Information Specialists; Maintenance Personnel; Operations Support; "Other" Support Services. Other images available are: a Screaming Eagle; an Eagle & Shield; U.S. flag (in color); "POW-MIA"; Jet Aircraft; among others. Also, personal names, rank, unit designations can be inscribed in raised letters, on the side panels, in one or two lines; limited only by the predetermined "letter allowance". If you use only one line, the letters used are bigger; if two lines are used, the letters are smaller.

The committee's recommendation to the BOD was for the Association not to get involved with the design and/or purchase of any rings, but to inform our members that personalized rings could be purchased by individual members and created in a variety of skills. The cost to create even a few of the basic skills (GCA, Tower, Crypto, Radio, etc,) would be a significant investment of our funds and additional workload on our volunteer PX/BX manager. Therefore, AACS Alumni Association members are advised that AACS type rings are available on the commercial market and members are free to design their own rings on an individual basis. A "Career" of an Air Force Wife (Excerpts from the Washington Post by Bart Barnes, Sunday, July 13, 2003)

"You had to look good to be good in Dorothy Grant's world. Just doing something-anything- right was not enough. You had to be poised and graceful, you had to look like you were doing it right. People had to notice. Grant was a horsewomen and a riding teacher. Horses were the love of her life. On horseback, she was at ease and at home, poised and graceful. She had

ridden since childhood on a ranch next to the Yankton Sioux Indian Reservation in South Dakota, where she was born and raised. She rode in the 1961 inaugural parade for President John F. Kennedy. She rode in horse shows where you are always trying to win.

In the 1960's and 1970's Grant ran Rock Creek Stables in Washington, DC, where she boarded horses, taught riding and organized trail rides through the park. She also arranged and managed annual riding tours in Hungary, Kenya, El Salvador and Portugal, well into the 1980's.

Dorothy Grant was the wife of Lt. General Harold Grant, whom she met in Hawaii in 1933 and traveled with him to Japan and to Air Force assignments across the United States. General Grant, who was inducted into the Air Force Communications & Information Hall of Fame in 1999 as one of the Founders who established the standards for today's "Air Force second to none Communications" died in 1989. On May 17, 2003 at the age of 93, Dorothy Grant died of pulmonary disease at a retirement home in Louisville, Colorado. Mrs. Grant, in addition to being active in running the Rock Creek Stables, was also known as a gracious hostess and the Air Force people who served with General Grant still remember her parties. She was more than capable of managing her time with horses and being the wife of an Air Force General."





### Queen's Award to 5 Britons For F-100 Rescue Attempt

WETHERSFIELD.—Five Britons who attempted to rescue an American pilot from his crashed and burning F-100D lighter-bomber last Dec. 30 have been awarded the Queen's Commendation for Brave Conduct. The men are E. G. Prentice and the brothers Michael, Robert and Brian Day, of Sible Hedingham, and P. Jarman, of Wickham St. Pauls.

led to the awards began at 6:14 pm last Dec. 17 when the field experienced a complete electrical power failure. In the darkening Kent sky, four F-86 Sabres under GCA control advised that they did not have sufficient fuel to proceed to an alternative field.

Approach control realized it would take 10 minutes to bring emergency runway lighting into operation. So, the request was flashed to two F-84s taxing on the runway to take up positions on each side of the strip and illuminate it.

21. Fog and rain had reduced visibility to 1½ miles when, at 4:22 pm, an F-86 contacted GCA. The craft missed its first two approaches. The pilot reported minimum fuel status. On the critical third, approach third approach, he was given a close pattern radar and brought down. FIFTEEN minutes

radar and brought down.

FIFTEEN minutes later, another F-86 requested a full-stop landing as weather conditions deteriorated further. Then, just one minute later, GCA picked up an emergency call from a T-33. Simultaneously the control tower reported a power failure.

Holding off the F-86, GCA contacted the T-30 on an emergency channel. The pilot said he was lost and his radio compass inoperative.

GCA-brought-the-aircraft-across to Manston, but the pilot missed his first approach. When he reported emergency fuel level, he was given a reverse surveillance approach and brought down.

GCA then turned its attention to the waiting F-86. By this time visibility was reduced to sixtention to the plane down safely.

AT 4:50 pm., another emergency call came through from an F-86: position unknown, its radio compass out of order. GCA placed the craft 12 miles northwest and directed it in.

with their landing lights, WATHIN seconds, the craft had moved into position, and minutes later the first two F-86s touched down. They, too, took up positions flanking the runway to aid the remaining Sabres to safety.

Two days lister, at 5.50 pm., two, E-100s called mayday on the emergency frequency. GCA picked them up 50 miles south of the base and brought them home.

### "Order of the Sword"







### TO: THOSE POTENTIAL MEMBERS OF THE AACS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

### **QUESTION: WHO OR WHAT IS THE AACS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION?**

ANSWER: An Association that is comprised of members who began their service in the Army Air Force before WWII and who served in the first dedicated communications element to provide communications and air traffic control as its primary mission and members who have served since then in any communications or air traffic control unit, including those serving today. This new Army Air Force organization, was formed in 1938 and was named the "Army Airways Communications System" (AACS). During WWII, it was renamed the "Air Communications Service" (ACS) and placed under the then "Air Transport Command" and within months was renamed once again to the "Airways and Air Communications Service" (AACS). In 1961, AACS was elevated to a Major Air Command and renamed "Air Force Communications Service" (AFCS). In 1979, the name was changed to "Air Force Communications Command" (AFCC). In the early 1990's the Air Force was undergoing major reorganizations and realignment of functions and AFCC was downsized and renamed the "Air Force Command, Control, Communications & Computers Agency" (AFCA) and shortly thereafter, was renamed the "Air Force Communications Agency" (AFCA) which is still an active Air Force organization. Also in the early 1990's, the Air Force created the "Air Force Flight Standards Agency" (AFFSA) and reassigned air traffic control responsibilities to this new Agency.

Over the years since the AACS Alumni Association was formed (1977) the membership criteria changed from individuals who only served in AACS units, to include all communicators/information/air traffic control and support skills regardless of what Major or Joint Command an individual served in, including today's active duty personnel.

Because of the heritage of the letters "AACS" and its unique contributions to long-haul communications and air traffic control, the Association has decided to maintain "AACS" as our organizational name. This could change in the future as our members who served from 1938 to 1961 are added to our "Missed Roll Call" list, and a new organizational name becomes more appropriate.

While the answer above is long, the short answer is "any individual who served or is serving in any Air Force Communications or Air Traffic Control unit, in any skill set, from 1938- to today, "is" the AACS Alumni Association.

The AACS motto of "Fellowship in the Company of Equals" is more than just words, but the glue that holds us all together through the different decades. The AACS Alumni Association is comprised of about 85% enlisted personnel and 15% officers, which includes over 50 General Officers.
