





CHAPLAIN'S CORNER 2010

Few would disagree that we are living in an age which worships the god of self-indulgence rather than Goddirected discipline. A person serious about following God, one who refuses to "get with it", that is the spirit of the moment, or rejects "doing your own thing", or "going with the flow" usually is looked upon as an odd ball, nerd, or whatever. The Web Site averages approximately 125 - 150 hits per-day. Since the web site was posted, there have been over 272,500 hits. The web Site is our biggest recruiter of new members. Since we created our new Database and started keeping more accurate records, the web site has been responsible for recruiting well over 800 new

members. The 2009 Cost for the web site was \$359.40 (most work is done by the Editor/Publisher).

Try to get stories and pictures to me <u>Not Later Than</u>: 1 April and 15 October of each year. But the earlier, the better.



This column is published for "claims" by Association members who think they are the "first", "hold a record" or the "only" person to have achieved or performed something that no other member has. Any challenges to claims previously published will be included in the current Communicator and we will identify as a "Challenges to previous published Claims".

NEW CLAIMS (Since the November 2009 Communicator):

1. Benjamin Doyle, MSgt USAF-Ret, from Murfreesboro, Tennessee, k4svc@comcast.net claims the following: o/a 1951 while in Newfoundland, I appeared before a promotion board up for SSgt. The board for that month was the Group Commander only. A full bird Colonel. I was working in Top Secret crypto work. My security Officer briefed me to answer only his questions, not to volunteer any input. He asked me several times if I had anything I wanted to say; I replied, no sir.

He indorsed my paper work back to Personnel saying I wasn't recommended for promotion because I didn't talk enough. So, I, a Top Secret worker, wasn't recommended for promotion because I didn't talk enough! The Colonel was told why I didn't make idle talk and he promoted me the following month.

Also o/a 1951 while in Newfoundland I volunteered for a classified mission. What the mission was, when and where was classified. Three weeks later we boarded a C-54 and headed north. We went through the Fjord into BW-1 for food and fuel. Made a high speed take off and went over the ice cap still heading north. Once over the ice cap the Colonel revealed our destination and mission. We were the first AACS people moving into Iceland to take over the comm mission from Lockheed. My job was to train incoming PCS people in comm center operations. I was there about 30 days, returned to Newfoundland where my state side rotational assignment back to Andrews AFB, Maryland was waiting. I was in AACS/AFCS comm operations from 1948 to 1970. Going into BW-1 through the Fjord was a real experience. We were below the mountain tops for about 25 minutes weaving around the mountains. And, the high speed take off from BW-1 was even more exciting. We made about three circles around the mountains before we cleared the tops. Once over the Ice Cap we saw the sun set behind us and come back up in front of us in about one hour. The month I was in Iceland it never did get completely dark.

- 2. Ross A. Stickley, 1330 67th Court W, Northfield, MN 55057-4226 Claims: To have Been part of the first class conducted at Scott AFB dedicated to the repair and maintenance of facsimile ("wire Photo") equipment. In May 1948, while I was stationed at Craig AFB, Alabama, I received my orders to report to Scott for four weeks "Facsimile Training", Special Radio Mechanic, AACS Transition TVC-1" school. Eight (8) others, from Chanute, McDill, Carswell, and Bergstrom AFB's were also in the group. The machine at Craig, and I suppose at other AFB's was not used by the Air Weather Service, whose equipment we in AACS maintained, to transmit and receive weather maps, and seemed always in need of some sort of TLC. We reported as ordered to our classroom on Monday and quickly discovered that none of the 5 machines on which we were to receive our schooling was in working order (big surprise). We also determined that the "Times-Telephoto" Tech-Reps sent to teach the course were considerably less technically competent than their students. Fortunately, it turned out that each of the "students" had previous experience maintaining similar equipment located at their respective stations, which resulted in the class becoming "self taught", and also in four of the five machines being operational at the time we returned to our home bases, in not four, but two, weeks later. None of Ross's classmates are Association and therefore, are not listed.
- 3. Ray Connell's claim brought to mind my military career. I first enlistmed in the U.S. Army for 18 months. After completing Infantry Basic Training I was sent to Germany. There I went to Radio Operator school and became a Radio Operator.

Five weeks after my discharge from the Army I enlisted in the Air Force. My first assignment was Las Vegas AB, Nevada. I was attached to the AACS Detachment and assigned duties as an Airways operator, all I did was take position reports and provide weather information. I was there one year when the Soviet Union

Blockaded Berlin. I volunteered and within several days I was on my way. When I arrived at Tempelhof AB I was taken to the room that controlled the inbound flights to Berlin. After a 30 minute briefing I was told I was now an Air Traffic Controller. There were three corridors (Airways) into Berlin from what use to be the West Zone of Germany. All inbound aircraft from the American Zone came into Berlin via the south Corridor. All traffic departing Berlin left via the Central corridor. Traffic arriving from the British Zone came into Berlin via the North Corridor. In other words we had "one way traffic" on all 3 Corridors. The Long Range Radar became operational in November 1947, before that it was the responsibility of the pilots to maintain separation by flying precise air speeds and altitudes.. When the Airlift ended I (and several other "Controllers") were sent to Frankfurt to work in the Frankfurt Radar Air Route Traffic Control Center. When we arrived we were dumbfounded. How could we control aircraft that were coming in from all points of the compass at different altitudes. Needless to say they pulled us out of the control room and set up a class to teach us Air Traffic Control procedures. After thirty days we really became Air Traffic Controllers.

I make three (3) claims: 1. I re-enlisted at the age of 17. 2. At the age of 18, I began my second overseas tour.

3. During my 18 1/2 years in the Air Force. I never attended any official Air Force School or Training.


Members must be present at the Annual General Meeting to vote. Proxy votes are not authorized by the Constitution and By Laws.


You need Adobe Reader and/or MS WORD to read or download to your computer. If you do not have Adobe Reader, there is a link to Adobe.com so you can download a free copy. We felt that we can allow more members to read or download the Communicator or the Membership Roster using the PDF format as it is the "de-facto" internet standard and that the Adobe Reader program can be downloaded free. You can use the PDF OR WORD EDIT/FIND functions to find names, units, etc, on the Membership Roster.

READ AND FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR DOWNLOADING. (Remember to RIGHT Click to get the "SAVE TO Menu")

"Membership Roster" or "Communicator". When you are inputting the downloading instructions, name the file "Membership Roster" or "Communicator" and then download to the folder you have created...this way, each time you download the roster or communicator, it will ask you if you want to replace the existing file....the answer is YES... this will save disk space and only store the current roster/communicator on your computer (unless you want to save multiple copies).

In 2004, the AACS Alumni Association voted to change our

New Role for Grand Forks Comm Unit: According to an Associated Press report, the airmen of the 319th Communications Squadron at Grand Forks AFB, N.D., cut a ceremonial ribbon Oct. 8 for their new mission-alternate control station for the Air Force's High Frequency Global Communication System. The system provides communications support for the White House and DOD agencies, US embassies, and military aircraft and ships. The primary system is located at Andrews AFB, Md. (Source: AFA)

Making the Switch: The 38th Engineering Installation Group at Tinker AFB, Okla., last month became the 38th Cyberspace Engineering Group and is now part of the newly activated 24th Air Force under Air Force Space Command, USAF's lead organization for cyber operations. The 38th CEG will be responsible for planning, engineering, and installing cyber-space-capable computer and communications systems at Air Force installations worldwide. The unit now falls under 24th AF's 688th Information Operations Wing. It was formerly under the Electronic Systems Center at Hanscom AFB, Mass., a component of Air Force Materiel Command. Col. Robert Skinner, 688th IOW commander, said cyberspace is not just a mission, but rather also "a place" that must be built and dominated like any potential battleground. "There's no unit I would rather have build that dominances, that place, than the individuals sitting here," he said of the 38th CEG.

Association Member Receives Prestigious Air Traffic Control Association Award

Colonel William Malec, Air Mobility Command Airspace and Airfield Operations Division Headquarters chief, received the Air Traffic Control Association's George W. Kriske Memorial Award Oct. 5th, 2009 at the association's annual awards luncheon in National Harbor, Md.

The award is named for Mr George W. Kriske, a long time federal air traffic controller who served more than 37 years of government service. The annual award recognizes an individual for an outstanding career which has added to the quality, safety or efficiency of air traffic control.

"I lead a staff of air traffic control and airfield management professionals that provides policy and oversight at AMC's 13 AMC bases and to more than 700 assigned air traffic controllers and airfield managers," said Colonel Malec.

Like the award's namesake, Colonel Malec also got his start as a radio operator. He enlisted in December 1968 and after completing ground radio operator technical training at Keesler Air Force Base Miss had various assignments as a radio operator at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base Ohio, Clark Air Base, Philippines' and Albrook Air Force Station, Panama Canal Zone.

After his promotion to technical sergeant, Colonel Malec decided to separate after almost 12 years of service to pursue a commission as an Air Force officer. In 1982 he was commissioned as a second lieutenant and assigned as an air traffic control officer, receiving basic air traffic control training at Keesler Air Force, Miss and advanced ATC officer training at Tyndall Air Force Base. Fla, where he was named a distinguished graduate.


During his more than 27 yours in the ATC career field, Colonel Malec has commanded, led and mentored air traffic controllers, airfield managers and weather specialists ass well as managed control towers, radar and weather facilities and airfields in the U.S., overseas and while deployed. King Comm conquers USAFE Flag Football Championship

11/17/2009 - RAMSTEIN AIR BASE, Germany -- Members from the 86th Communications Squadron, "King Comm," conquered Europe when they defeated the 731st Munitions Squadron, "Camp Darby," in the U.S. Air Forces in Europe Flag Football Championship held at Camp Darby, Italy, Nov. 12 through 16. Finals went into double overtime, and Ramstein beat Camp Darby 20-19, securing them the coveted title of USAFE Flag Football Champions for 2009. "We were on the verge of being defeated earlier in the tournament and were able to bounce back and take first," said Randy McGinnis, Ramstein's quarterback. "Going into double overtime was very stressful, but it taught me a valuable lesson to trust your teammates in overtime. If we could score, then the offense would look after us to clinch the victory." The Camp Darby team, which had only been playing together for a week, played some impressive defense, McGinnis added. "It was a challenging tournament as we had 99 percent of our guys playing both ways with only one guy to substitute in, and we normally practice against each other and not as a team," said Johnny Escobar, Camp Darby's quarterback. "It was hard work, but we stuck through it and played some amazing games.

Ten Air Force unit-level flag football teams traveled across Europe to Camp Darby for the first combined USAFE Flag football championship. Divided into two pools, the top contenders in the semifinals were Team Comm; the 31st Security Forces Squadron from Aviano Air Base, Italy; the 52nd Logistic Readiness Squadron from Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany; and Camp Darby.

Ramstein beat Aviano 27- 6 and Camp Darby beat Spangdahlem 26-7, leaving Aviano and Spangdahlem to fight for third. Spangdahlem beat Aviano 6-0 in overtime.

"We had to overcome individual injuries and going into overtime was very stressful, but we played together, we played smart and we left it on the field," said Trey Doby, Spangdahlem's receiver.

USAFE Sports Director, Thomas Burkett, said the camaraderie between the teams was outstanding. He added that the tournament will be held at Camp Darby again next year.

Randy McGinnis and Ramstein's running back Blane Woodard made the All Star Team for King Comm, and the team's quarterback went on to become the game's most valuable player.

King Comm won a place at the championships in Camp Darby after winning the local flag football championship. They also recently battled the Army in flag football, adding another win to their accomplishments.

McKinley selects new senior enlisted advisor for NGB

Congrats to an ex Air Traffic Controller & a Communicator.

Arlington, VA (11/19/09) - Gen. Craig R. McKinley, the chief of the National Guard Bureau, announced today the selection of a new senior enlisted advisor for the National Guard Bureau.

Chief Master Sgt. Denise Jelinksi-Hall of the Hawaii Air National Guard will be the third senior enlisted advisor assigned to the Office of the Chief, National Guard Bureau. She will be responsible for advising McKinley on enlisted affairs of the 457,000 Soldiers and Airmen of the Army and Air National Guard.

Jelinksi-Hall began her Air Force career in 1984 as an air traffic control operator at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb. Four years later, she transferred to the communications field and the California Air National Guard.

She joined the Hawaii guard in 1990 and became the command chief master sergeant for the 154th Wing at Hickam Air Force Base in 2004. Before coming to the NGB, she was the senior enlisted leader, which is a joint position, for the Hawaii Guard.

"We are very proud of Chief Jelinksi-Hall's selection as the senior enlisted advisor for the National Guard Bureau," said Army Maj. Gen. Bob Lee, the adjutant general of the Hawaii National Guard. "She has accomplished many things in her 25-year career, and she will continue to excel at the national level. She will represent our Soldiers and Airmen extremely well."

McKinley made the announcement to hundreds of general officers and other senior Guard leaders at the Joint Senior Leadership Conference being held at the Gaylord Hotel on National Harbor outside of Washington this week.

This is in regards to the note from Dan Pastor on page 27 of the Nov. 09 Communicator. I was at Westover AFB from 1949 to 1952. I knew Henry Boucher well; he was best man at my wedding in Boston in early 1951. He married a girl named Shirley, who was the only child of a family that owned sporting goods stores in the Boston area. I lost track of him but back in 1970 while in the Boston area, I looked him up in the phone book and we talked for about an hour but could not work out a get-together. They had inherited the sporting goods stores and Henry was managing them.

The name Dan Pastor sounded familiar but I can't place him. I worked in the control tower when it was atop the base hanger for about a year then went to GCA school then westover GCA for the rest of my four year hitch. In early 1952 I went TDY for about three months to Limestone AFB, Maine (later Loring, the base was being constructed) GCA in early 1952. Lt. Monroe was there also, however, I did not know he was with AACS. The only time I saw him was in the mess hall. No O club yet so the officers had a section of the mess hall. He always carried a snub nosed revolver.

I have no recall of which area of Boston Henry was from. He must be in his early 80's now and probably retired from the business.

Like the other people who write in to you, I, too, get a "re-charge" every time there is a story about some phase in my journey with the old Army Air Corps/AAF. In this latest issue (Nov. '09), the letter by Mike Norin sure provoked memories! Each time I've read of the sinking of the RHOMA, it makes me recall what happened and caused me to end up in CBI. Not



unlike many others, I'm sure, our orders seemed to be "cut" by magic. Upon receiving my orders for o'seas duty on the morning of D-Day (6/6/44), I first was sent to McClellan Field, SACO for processing rumored to be bouind for BORNEO; then, yanked out of there and sent to Selfridge Field (Mich) for ETO duty....AACS guys were being reclassified right and left to INFANTRY to fill the "slots" in ETO. So, I was resigned to that fact, when all of a sudden a contingent was hastily made up and we were sent to Miami Beach for who knew where. The story behind why we escaped ETO Infantry duty, was, that similar to the RHOMA, an AACS contingent was lost when their plane flipped on landing in a sea, all drowned, and we were their replacements--poor fellas. That has always haunted me when reading of the RHOMA sinking. Mike mentions the route he took getting to "INJAH"; I wonder how many 1,000s of us flew that same route to Casablanca, across Africa, fueling at Abadan, and so forth. A few years after the end of WW2 an ex-GI started a major reproduction business in Spokane, WA and named it after ABADAN. The business had an outlet shop here in Richland, due to all the engineering blueprints and other forms of reproduction for Hanford Atomic Plant. In recent years they relocated the main shop here in Richland. Strange how crazy places we were assigned to carried over; similarly, the Enterprise Auto Rental is named because a guy was a crew member on the Enterprise Aircraft Carrier. Well, thanks for listening to an old 85 yr old spout off again. **Bob Bush**








One of our better dressed members (Mike Norin) upholding the dress code for "Radio Operators"



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




Hosts and Co-Hosts for 2011 St Louis, Missouri

silent and just as deadly enemy named Agent Orange.

A mother holds a picture of her daughter close to her bosom, a helicopter pilot, killed in action in Iraq. She sits silent, no tears; the pain has made her numb.

She remembers giving birth to this beautiful little girl. She remembers this child going to her high school senior prom in a lovely gown, looking so perky and cute. She remembers this lovely young woman graduating from college and having the smile and gleam in her eye that promised a bright future.

She remembers the pride she had when this beautiful young woman got her military commission and had those helicopter pilot wings pinned to her uniform. Now she is gone. The tears will come later, along with that primal scream that we all have hidden inside us.

A young woman with her child greets her husband who has just returned from Afghanistan after a year of separation. They both struggled to survive. Now they will struggle to survive the transition of being together again.

These situations have been repeated thousands of times in thousands of different ways. As we approach Veterans Day on Nov. 11, let us not forget the thousands of veterans who are "fading away" each day. These veterans who served and sacrificed in defense of this nation will be slipping into the abyss of time only to be remembered by their friends and family. As time passes even those memories will be fading away.

Let us also think about the millions of living veterans who have served this nation well. They go quietly on with their lives, not looking for adulation. Yet, to them the words duty, honor, country are indelibly engraved in their hearts and minds.

Some of these men and women have lived through horrible experiences that burn in their memories; memories no human being should have to endure. Whether they fought in combat, or were support groups behind the lines of battle, or served during peace time, they all made their special sacrifices.

There are now approximately 23 million veterans across this country. Some were drafted into service, others enlisted. They all did their duty and more. Many came home wounded both physically and mentally. We owe a great debt of gratitude for the sacrifices these men and women and their families have made.



The tower was brand new, about 70 feet high on 4 wooden piers. The receivers and transmitter had arrived and with signal corps technicians we helped install them and other equipment. I arrived here with Sgt Harlan Smith. The other 2 operators who had also just arrived were Sgt's Voves and Griggs. Our NCOIC was SSgt Pope. Eventually we all separated with different assign-

ments. But I will always remember the Bluethenthal Field Tower, Wilmington, NC.





In addition, there is a Hospitality Committee that will provide the Host with the items to be purchased and will arrive early to set up the hospitality room thereby reliving the Host from this chore. In addition, we have purchased a lap top computer, a printer and a copier to assist the Host in managing the reunion. A Microsoft Access Database was developed to support the 2003 Convention/Reunion in Fairfax, Virginia and has been updated and used at the 2004 and 2005 Conventions/Reunions at Scottsdale, AZ and Overland Park, KS. We are currently modifying the Convention/Reunion Database to make it easier for the Hosts to use from one year to the year, with as little or no modifications as necessary. The Database will provide over 25 reports the Host will need to tract registrations fee, tours, golf, meal choices, etc and also provide them with the information needed to complete the final convention/reunion financial report.

The November 2005 issue of the AACS Communicator (page 70) contained a proposal format for potential Hosts and for some of the things that must be considered in selecting a hotel and location to hold our annual conventions/reunion. See item below for minimum requirements.

We are still looking for a few "good men or women" to step up to the plate and begin the process with the Convention/Reunion Committee to determine if your proposed site/hotel meets our requirements. Hope to hear from lots of you.

Proposal to Host a Convention/Reunion

For potential convention/reunion hosts, the following are some of the minimum things that must be considered in order to Host one the Associations annual conventions/reunions:

- 1 A location that has a number of attractions to offer the majority of our members.
- 2 A major airport, easy Interstate access, golf courses, etc.
- 3 A hotel that can book 125-175 rooms, can seat up to 300-350 for breakfast and banquet and the Annual General Meeting.
- 4 Are there other association members locally that can assist the host.
- 5 Potential hosts must be computer literate (you need minimum skills to enter and retrieve convention information)

If a potential host feels that he/she can nominate a city that meets the above minimum requirements, he/she should contact the Executive Director (who is also the Chair of the Convention/Reunion Committee).

Dear Mr. Sauer,

I appreciate this opportunity to thank you and some of your members and readers, for the help I received in completing a college research paper last fall.

Last summer, while visiting family in Parkersburg, WV, I was introduced to Mr. Paul Hawkins, who, in 1949, as part of the 1946th AACS, was sent to Berlin to help set up and maintain the new AN/CPS-5 Medium Range Search Radar equipment. From our interview, I quickly realized that without the skill and proficiency of the air traffic controllers, the pilots could not have achieved such incredible turnaround times in some of the worst weather conditions of 1948/1949. I decided to research the subject more fully, but it proved challenging. Many books concentrated on the political aspects of the Airlift or the accomplishments of the pilots, but I could not find as much information about the Air Traffic Controllers. Since Mr. Hawkins had spoken of the 1946th, I researched that lead and came across the www.afcommatc.org website, which is when I emailed you.

You passed along my emails and I was delighted to hear from Mr. Mac Maginnis, Mr. Jim Giles Jr., and Mr. Don Pastore. Their willingness to share some of their memories allowed me to personalize the Airlift in my research paper. More importantly, I made new friends as we emailed back and forth. Mr. Maginnis even lent me his copy of the history of "The 1946th and the Berlin Airlift!" Through their information, I was put in touch with Mr. Dan Harrington, a historian at Langley AFB, who took the time to comment on my paper and make some great suggestions. I received an "A" on my paper and my college professor is now encouraging me to expound upon it with the possibility of later publication. I can only say thank you to all of you.

Dear Hank;

I happened to wear my AACS black slipover shirt the other day (I have only used it couple of time in the 4-5 years I have owned it), and it set me thinking. I wonder if I might be the surviving member of the group who had the earliest assignment to an AACS Squadron. I was posted to Maxwell AB to the 4th AACS Squadron (a fairly recently formed unit) in October, 1941, upon graduation from the ROM course at Scott AB. Our Commander was Lt. Col. Baxter and our First Shirt was an old China hand, named Skipper (Blind as a Bat, but an exceptional gentleman). Worked Control Tower briefly, then the CW Ground to Air station for a few weeks until I volunteered for a classified assignment. This resulted in locating on Abadan Island, Iran the first part of 1942 (May, I think), where our group of five communicators erected a Quonset Hut, and built the first point to point CW station in the Middle East or SE Asia. I was a Corporal, 2d Class Air Mechanic, and our NCOIC was S/SGT Artimovich, a second hitch veteran and my mentor. It was a couple of months before we finally "found" an AACS station in ACCRA in West Africa (on a 9 Meg. frequency we knew AACS used in the U.S.), It had just opened. We also "found" a signal corps point to point station a couple of weeks later, which was opening in Karachi, so the three of us formed an informal net and passed traffic when conditions allowed until a squadron was formed in Cairo and we joined it.

Beginning COMBINED ENDEAVOR By Buford R. (Randy) Witt, Brig. Gen., USAF (Ret.)

The Partnership for Peace program originated following the changes of Soviet Union policies which were most dramatically demonstrated by the opening of inter-European borders and especially the breaching of the Berlin Wall in 1989. President George H. W. Bush led a carefully crafted diplomatic effort to keep the U. S. role supportive and to focus on European leadership of these obviously

European issues.



I arrived at European Command as Director of Command and Control Communications and Computer Systems in July 1994. The Partnership activities were actively managed by the various directors of the European Command staff; the J-6 had begun its activities in 1992. Visits to the East European partner countries by the staff had been made. Also, escorted trips to visit U. S. communications facilities had been conducted twice. These were important steps in beginning a dialog among countries that had been separated for years.

After a short time at Stuttgart another visit to the U. S. was being prepared. As I reviewed the plan and the budget, I developed the opinion that while this was good for relationship building, that purpose had already been served by the preceding trips and that such trips were more social than purposeful in a practical sense. I actually discussed canceling the forthcoming trip but rapidly found that I would create something of an international incident, and I use those words with their strict definition in mind. I remember saying, though, "This will be the last one; we need to do something pragmatic and meaningful." It stayed on my mind.

My first visit to one of our Partnership for Peace countries was to Hungary. My trip officer and I were in the hotel bar (where all truly great strategies are conceived) on the evening before my first meeting with the Hungarian Minister of Defense. I reviewed my thinking with Lt. Commander Bud Bishop, USN, that what we should be doing is working technical issues with the countries-like trying to see how we could make our communications systems work together in the field as allies in operations. A communications field exercise, if you will, where we don't rely on buying a whole new generation of equipment, but we bring what we have and we try to make it work together-telephone systems, message teletype, computers, etc. Something that then would serve us all if we were to go on a humanitarian aid mission, or the like (and at that early stage studiously avoiding suggestion of military combat scenarios). We made some points on the back of a napkin, literally.

The next morning, I went to meet the Minister. I recall even today that my impression was that he looked every bit of how I imagined a Hungarian would look: large frame and a shock of white hair that I envied even 15 years ago. We chatted for a while. Then I brought up my principal subject-explaining that the trips like the one our staffs were then on were nice but not practical in a real way, I introduced the idea of a Partnership for Peace Communications Interoperability field exercise. Well, the Minister sat up in his chair behind his desk, reared back raising his arm, and slammed his large fist decisively on the desk! "That is exactly what we should do!" There was no doubt, I told Bud Bishop later, that the idea had found support. I trotted the idea to other partners, and received the same enthusiastic responses.

We began developing a formal concept at Stuttgart. Soon we had an objective outline which featured several planning conferences which we would lead. We consulted our components commands-US Army Europe, USAF Europe and NAVEUR and brought them on board. We would need their expertise and manpower to host and manage the planning and execution of the exercise.

We discussed the concept with our German counterparts. Germany would be invited to participate for it was on its soil and the process to coordinate six East European countries to come to Germany was a significant diplomatic effort in its own right. This was new; never before had these former communist armies been brought to a NATO country for a military event. We had engaged our Ambassador at EUCOM, Jacques Klein, the U. S. Embassy in Bonn, and the responsible German Ministry in the coordination and approval process. It was not soon in coming, but over time we achieved the goal and had agreement that the U. S. could host the event in Germany We began serious and begin planning.

As we began the first planning conference hosted at European Command Headquarters, we learned that the planning process itself was a key learning outcome for the partner countries for through it we began to develop standard methods and processes. Not that the U. S. way was the only one, but it surely was the most developed and practiced

method for the U. S. planned exercises and contingency operations so often. We had settled on eight PFP national participants for the exercise: Those Partnership members each sent communications technicians to the five planning conferences that we held from March through August 1995.

Personally, I wanted these exercises to be more than a mere technical practice, as important as I believed that would be for future real-world work (as it indeed proved to be in Bosnia, Kosovo and Afghanistan). I wanted it to capture the feel of a real military event, with appropriate ceremony. So, we planned opening and closing events with the participating units in formation, flags flying. We also planned welcoming social events and a farewell dinner.

The first COMBINED ENDEAVOR was hosted in September 1995 at Kelly Barracks in Stuttgart with Austria, Poland, Hungary, Slovenia, Slovakia, the Czech Republic, Bulgaria, Rumania, and of course, Germany, and the U. S. The exercise site was full of the tents, communications equipment and vehicles that each country brought. The planning conferences had winnowed through all the possible communications that might be set up - telephone systems were key and some the message systems with transmission means such as microwave, tropo-spheric scatter systems and satellite systems provided by the U. S. There were also radio systems, such as High Frequency.

Each country's team was about 12 people, not counting all the host and support staff from the U. S. and Germany. They were a proud group of soldiers who felt that this was an important milestone in our nations' modern histories; and it was. By the time COMBINED ENDEAVOR was it its second year, the Secretary of Defense was citing it in his speeches as a significant event in the progress of the relations with East Europe and General John Shalikashvili, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, called to request me to meet with him to give him my personal insight about the exercise. The next year COMBINED ENDEAVOR '96 was conducted from 14 - 28 August 1996 at two sites: Sembach Air Base, Germany, and Bruck, Austria. Austria's agreement to host one of the workshops set a significant precedent -- it was the first time Austria invited foreign military forces to conduct training on sovereign soil since the government eased its strict neutrality policy. The diplomatic effort in that is a story in itself.

Twelve nations participated in 1996. These included all of the nations that participated i CE 95n joined by the Baltic States of Latvia and Lithuania. NATO was represented at CE 96 not only by Germany and the United States, but also by a United Kingdom military communications detachment from Allied Land Forces Central Europe (LANDCENT). COMBINED ENDEAVOR 96 built upon the success of CE 95 by expanding interoperability testing to slightly more complex communications configurations. A simple switched network was demonstrated which was based on NATO procedures.

When I opened the official Exercise at Bruck, I looked out on the formation of twelve different nations with the flags of each, standing in Austria where no foreign military troops had stood since World War II. I recall in my comments that I said: "Here we stand, in formation with more uniforms from more nations than have been together in Austria since the times of Napoleon."

This time we had a band in the formation. The Austrian Army Band had written a march especially for the occasion, "The COMBINED ENDEAVOR March." The Band Master, after completing the musical piece, marched forward and presented me with two copies, one for the Supreme Commander, Europe, General George Joulwan, which I later presented to him, and one for myself, which I still hold as a wonderful memento. In thanking him I said: "Only here outside Vienna, the City of Music, could we expect such a gracious gesture as composing an original military march."

COMBINED ENDEAVOR has not only continued, but also it has grown dramatically. It is now 40 countries strong. It has proven to be a powerful instrument in our mutual work in numerous real international actions and no doubt has been one of the invaluable ways we achieve peaceful relations among nations-having our good people work together in a productive and practical way.

More important than that, however, is the fact that COMBINED ENDEAVOR did what it was designed to do. As proven in the Bosnian conflict, Iraq and Afghanistan, national contingents fro the participants worked together in true multinational peacekeeping and war fighting missions and the shared experiences and common training in communications planning and interoperability made a positive contribution to those efforts.

Chief Master Sgt. Richard P. "Hank" Sauer is the first enlisted inductee, Class of 2001. He entered the Air Force in 1948, after serving 13 months in the Naval Reserve. He completed the Air Force Administrative Course and a crash course for cryptographic operators, before being assigned to Germany in support of the Berlin Airlift. He was assigned to the 1946th AACS Squadron, Templehof Airport, Germany; 1812th AACS Group, Munich Riems Airport, Germany; and the 1807th AACS Wing, Wiesbaden, Germany. In 1952, he was assigned to the Air Force Cryptographic School at Scott AFB, Ill., as the technical advisor, and in 1954, Chief Sauer went to the 1809th AACS Group, Nagoya Japan,

where he performed duties as the staff NCO for Cryptographic Operations, Weather Systems, Plans & Programs and War Plans. In 1957 he was transferred to HQ AACS, Andrews AFB, Md., as the NCOIC of the War Plans Division and was in the advance party setting up the Headquarters functions for the move to Scott in 1958. He has served in a variety of communications positions and commands during his career. He was assigned to the Air Attaché Office in the American Embassy, London, England; HQ European Communications Area, Wiesbaden, Germany; and HQ AFCS, Richards-Gebaur AFB, Mo. He also served with the HQ Aviation Engineer Force, Wolters AFB, Texas; 414th Fighter Group, Oxnard AFB, Calif.; 2163rd Communications Sq., RAF Station Wethersfield, England; 18th CS, Westover AFB, Mass.; the 1876th CS, Tan Son Nhut, Vietnam; and the 2147th CS. RAF Mildenhall, England. Before his retirement in 1975, Chief Sauer was assigned to the Command, Control and Communications Directorate, HQ Air Force and functioned as an Executive and Air Staff Action Officer in the Operations Division. After retiring from the Air Force, he joined the U.S. Energy Research & Development Agency (ERDA), which later became the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) in their Oak Ridge Operations Office, Oak Ridge, Tenn. There, he rose to be the chief of computing and telecommunications. He left DOE in 1987 and was the European Manager for the contractor that successfully developed and implemented the automated Wing Command & Control System (WCCS) for the Tactical Fighter Wings in USAFE. He also served as vice president for a small Systems/Information Company dedicated to the DOE national weapons complex. He was the first enlisted executive director of the AACS Alumni Association, and continues to serve as the editor/publisher of the "Communicator", as well as manager of the Web Site.



Chief Master Sgt. William L. Bethea is the second enlisted person to be inducted. Class of 2006. He entered the Air Force in 1951 and after basic training, attended Teletype and Crypto Maintenance School at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo. His first assignment was at the 1932nd Communications Squadron in Labrador, where he worked for fellow Hall of Fame member, Maj. Gen. Paul Stoney. After a tour in Europe from 1954 through 1955, he was assigned to the 2049th Communications Group, McClellan AFB, Calif., and worked on the first online link encryption device. In 1958 he became one of

the first secure voice technicians assigned to the Pentagon and was selected to establish the first Air Force Communications/Information Maintenance work center supporting the National Military Command Center. He moved to Germany four years later to the 1946th Communications Squadron, then back to the Pentagon for almost another four years as a special projects NCO. In 1968, he was sent to Korea to install a secure voice network at all bases there after the USS Pueblo was attacked by North Korean forces. He and his team had the net up and running in 60 days. Master Sgt. Bethea then spent a year at Phan Rang AB, Vietnam, serving as superintendent of maintenance (chief master sergeant position), disaster preparedness NCO, and crypto maintenance supervisor in a combat environment. After a final Pentagon tour, his last assignment brought him to the Headquarters Defense Communications Agency as superintendent of the facilities control branch. He managed the performance of around the clock technical control, crypto, radio, wire, and audio/video support for the DCA. Following retirement in 1978, he helped the Department of Energy implement national policy for communications security related programs at nuclear weapons complex production plants and laboratories. He was later named a Director of MANTECH International Corp. as a Director for Department of State and Department of Energy Telecommunications and Security contracts.



Chief Master Sgt. Charles E. Teston , Class of 2007.

Chief Teston's 31-year active duty career included being a Looking Glass flight crew member, academic instructor, first sergeant with the largest communications group in the Air Force, a Senior Enlisted Advisor at the wing and HQ level; superintendent of radio operations and a career advisor. As the Air Force Communications Command senior enlisted advisor, he visited units at 57 different locations and formed an effective Chief's Group to enhance career progression of all enlisted personnel. After

retirement and another 10 years as an industry telecommunications manager, he moved his family to Gulfport, Miss., where he was elected to the Gulfport City Council and served as President in 2003. A Gulf Coast Chamber of Commerce Centurion, he was elected president of the Orange Grove/Lyman Chamber of Commerce for 2007.



Chief Master Sgt. Walter D. McLain, Class of 2008

This "one-of-a-kind" air traffic controller, who served from 1962 to 1991, is credited with six certified aircraft saves -- two in combat situations. During Chief McLain's 21 years as a controller, senior controller, watch supervisor, trainer and chief controller, he earned master certifications in his field, upgraded training programs for the Air Force, received outstanding ratings from inspectors, resolved critical airspace issues and earned numerous awards for his leadership skills. He was the first air

traffic controller to serve as an AFCC Division and Command Senior Enlisted Advisor (now Command CMSgt). Prior to his selection as the AFCC SEA, he was the first Air Traffic Controller to serve as Commandant the AFCC NCO PME Center.

While there he directed the development of the first suicide prevention program to be used in NCO PME. His program was credited with saving five lives in the first year and it became the initial prototype for all Air Force NCO PME schools. He upgraded the audiovisual and computer systems and his was the first Command NCO PME Center to provide students with access to computer systems for classroom and research work.

He became a special assistant to Military Airlift Command's (now Air Mobility Command) air traffic services director and played a key role in acquiring GPS for air traffic control support. He also played a key role in the site selection for the joint-use air traffic control facilities at Scott AFB. He received the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal (4 oak leaf clusters), the AFCM (4 oak leaf clusters) and the Airman of the Year ribbon, just to name a few.




Master Sgt. Duffy is the fifth enlisted person to be inducted into the "Hall of Fame" Class of 2010. His double Career began in January 1955 ending in June 1997; totaling over 42 years of government Service. In the AF he started as a Crypto Operator and, prior to the consolidation of the Comm. career Fields, he personally trained over 75 personnel in Crypto Operations with 100 percent transition rate. When stationed at Tan Son Nhut AB, RVN he was responsible for the second largest COM-SEC account; second only to the AF Cryptologic Depot. Arriving at Westover AFB he went from a shift member, to a Shift supervisor, to NCOIC of Base Comm., the only TSgt to do so. His 2nd tour in

Vietnam was at Pleiku AB where he was tasked, to terminate all comm. activities within 90 days. This was done in less than 80 days and based on his performance was assigned to RAF Bruggen, Germany as Site Commander, the only TSgt to achieve this distinction. His last AF assignment was at Hq SAC, where he was the COMSEC Manager for 12 Air Force Special Security Offices and where he attained the rank of MSgt. Sgt Duffy has always been a trend setter and due to his unique experience was appointed as a Dept. of State Foreign Service Comm. Officer. His first 3 assignments were Moscow, Beijing, and Berlin; three high volume hardship postings with a follow-on assignment to Sydney, Australia. Where his outstanding performance resulted in two high State Dept. awards; the only Communications Officer to do so. Based on his performance, he was assigned to Hq State Dept. where he was the COMSEC Manager for over 70 overseas significant COMSEC worldwide activities. He has earned many decorations, such as the Bronze Star, AFCM (3 Oak Leaf Clusters), Outstanding Unit Award (2 Oak Leaf Clusters w/"V" device), Vietnam Gallantry Cross (w/Palms), two Dept of State Superior and one Meritorious Honor Awards.







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OUESTION: Who or what are we?

ANSWER: An Association that is comprised of over 2,200 members who began their service in the Army Air Corps and/or the Signal Corps before WWII and who served in the first dedicated communications element to provide communications and air traffic control as its primary mission and members who have served since then in any communications or air traffic control unit, including those serving today. This new Army Air Corps organization was formed in 1938 and was named the "Army Airways Communications System" (AACS). During WWII, it was renamed the "Air Communications Service" (ACS) and placed under the then "Air Transport Command" and within months was renamed once again as the "Airways and Air Communications Service" (AACS). In 1961, AACS was elevated to a Major Air Command and renamed "Air Force Communications Service" (AFCS). In 1979, the name was changed to Air Force Communications Command" (AFCC). In the early 1990's the Air Force was undergoing major reorganizations and realignment of functions and AFCC was downsized and renamed the "Air Force Command, Control, Communications & Computers Agency" (AFC4A) and shortly thereafter, was renamed the "Air Force Communications Agency" (AFCA). Also in the early 1990's, the Air Force created the "Air Force Flight Standards Agency" (AFFSA), and reassigned air traffic control responsibilities to this new Agency and to the Major Air Commands. In 2009, AFCA was renamed the "Air Force Integration Center" and placed under the AF Space Command along with the newly created 24th Air Force (for Cyber functions). Over the years since the AACS Alumni Association was formed (1977) the membership criteria changed from individuals who only served in AACS units, to include all communicators/information/cyber/air traffic control and support skills regardless of what Major or Joint Command an individual served in, including today's active duty personnel.

The motto of "Fellowship in the Company of Equals" is more than just words, but the glue that holds us all together through the different decades. The Association is comprised of about 85% enlisted personnel and 15% officers, which includes many General Officers, both active and retired.
