

FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



The Board of Directors continue to review our long term financial trends and possible courses of actions if additional funds are needed. There was a committee report by Bob Akard, the Chair of the Fiscal Management and Budget Policy Committee and the overall status is in the Minutes of the Board of Directors Minutes in this issue of the AACS Communicator. The thrust of his report to the Board of

Directors was to provide an overall review of the "State of Financial Health of the Association". However, it is evident that in the out-years, some hard decisions will have to be made, just based on membership numbers.

Of some concern to me as the current Executive Director, and other Board Members, is the growing loss of our pre-WWII, WWII and Korean Veterans and the increasing number of Life Members. We are getting close to 50% of our membership being Life Members, which has a significant impact on our annual revenue stream.

We currently have approximately 2300 members, with a little over 1,000 being Life Members. This leaves approximately 1200 members who are paying annual dues over a number of different years. Based on 400 members dues expiring each year and the premise that all will submit dues for the following two years, we can plan on an income stream of approximately \$8,000. The income stream of \$8,000 is less than half of what our annual expenses have been and are not enough to continue to run the Alumni Association as we have in the past. Past statistics shows that only 60% of the members whose dues are expiring, renew their dues (due to death, illness, etc). Some loss of income is made up by new members, but recent trends show losses are growing faster than we can recruit new members.

There are a number of actions we can take to offset the loss of revenue and not change the quality of service to our members. The following actions are very general in nature and are not listed in any specific order of precedence or that any or all of them will be needed and/or implemented. They are areas that all our members must be aware of, that the Board of Directors will consider them, and at some time in the future, take the actions necessary, if needed, for us to remain a viable and solid Alumni Association:

- Raise the Life Membership dues.
- Raise the annual dues.
- Recruit more members.
- Reduce the AACS Communicator to an Annual Publication and/or reduce the number of pages in each issue.
- Solicit donations. .
- Implement some or all of the above (when and if appropriate).

This is not a doom and gloom situation. But an honest picture of the decisions that this and future Board of Directors will have to wrestle with if we are to continue to remain in a sound financial situation. The BOD has approved a member donation solicitation to be announced in the June 2007 issue of the AACS Communicator. For the first time in our history, we will be asking members to make a taxable deduction to the Alumni Association. We will, as other non-profits have done, ask for donations of whatever our members can afford; \$25, \$50, \$75, \$100 or other. These donations will provide the financial support/funds needed to plan for the eventful major loss of our WWII and Korean War Veteran members. The raising of dues will then be pushed way out in the out-years and we can continue to be a viable and effective association for years to come.

BOARD MEETING MINUTES Sept. 28, 2006 Covington, KY

Executive Director Hank Sauer opened the Sept. 28, 2006 AACS-AA Board meeting for business. All Board members were present.

Hank announced his executive privilege under By-Laws Article VI, section one to reduce the Board positions from nine to seven, and to be announced in the November 2006 Communicator. This reduction will be accomplished by the elimination of the Director-USAF Liaison and the Director of Publicity whose duties will be absorbed by other Board members. His purpose was to make the Board commensurate with an organization our size. The full Board approved this step.

Old Business: Hank moved the minutes of the 2005 Board meeting in Overland Park, KS as printed in the November 2005 Communicator be approved. The motion was seconded and carried.

Hank requested Bob Akard to report on the mail voting for the proposed amendment to our By-Laws governing Board position nominees to first be given to the Nominating Committee. Bob reported 10 yea and no nay votes.

The next issue for the annual Board was to approve the standard benevolent donations totaling \$2,900 going to four agencies. Also, E. D. Sauer reminded us of our electronic vote approving the absorption of Board members' hotel room costs through the current reunion costs. This will continue as is authorized under By-laws Article IV, section 2. The Board was then poled by position to report any conduct or recommendations pertaining to that position. Elaborations were from:

Membership Director Maginnis explained the details of our aging demographics and the dues structure creating income, all of which will be presented at the general membership Meeting Saturday morning, Sept, 30th. The problem facing our future continues to be attrition of the most senior members and inadequate flow of new members. We are averaging 11 new members monthly coming mostly from our web-site, and with 30% paying lifetime membership. Mac asked for any general member who might assume membership directorship to please contact him to consider an apprenticeship, subject to the Nominating Committee and the full Board's approval. He has family illness issues that are reducing his time to spend on this responsibility.

Vice Director Stan Phillips reported on his research for a convention site for 2008. He was given Board support to make attend a FAM trip to Jacksonville, FL in November 2006. He also mentioned three other thoughts that will be explored and reported.

Director of Publicity Dan Morabito reported his ad insertions in veteran's publications about our reunions and offering membership to eligible.

Treasurer Ray Sharpless detailed his current banking activity and customer satisfaction with Bank of Belton in his hometown. Also, an inventory and product line was reviewed for popularity and inventory balance.

Executive Secretary Bob Akard, also serving as Chair of the Fiscal Management/Audit Committee, report an interim and spontaneous limited audit of Board members' expense activity. No exceptions were found. He also presented a four year analysis of our cash assets which revealed a steady cash and CD balance. Our balances for this period have only fluctuated by two to three thousand dollars, when factoring back the \$5,000 we donated the Katrina fund through the AF Relief Fund for Keesler AFB enlisted families.

E D Hank Sauer spoke of his tenure as E D, and his Board support with many accomplishments to benefit the Association. He confirmed his intentions from 2005 to serve only two years, and then support Stan Phillips to be elected into his position. He would then request of the new E D to reappoint him officially to the Board as the Editor/Publisher. Hank gave figures on his success to find vendor of quality who have reduced his Communicator publishing costs.

Annual budget estimates sent to the E D in June were reviewed with the group for opportunities to change and for approval. Our hopes are to exceed Maginnis' estimate of \$11,600 from dues is our best help toward avoiding a deficit of \$5,550. Our expenses have been scrutinized to the bare bone. An earlier release to the Board by E D Sauer contained several subjects that could be considered for avoiding future deficits. Each was discussed but tabled until next year, or until our cash assets diminish to a level of concern. Presently, and based upon our last four year history, we have no reason to act.

The Board approved our slate of candidates for re-election to the Board, those being Dan Morabito, Gen. Prather, and Bill Bethea. Also confirmed was the nomination of CMSgt. Walter McLain for AACS-AA nomination for election into the AF Communication Information Hall of Fame. Col. Derrrel Dempsey and Chief Walter McLain will be inducted into our own Hall of Honor. Also approved were three grand dames of our association's history for Life Achievement Awards, they being Smitty McClellan, Mary Lou Brewer and Shirley Beachum.

Bob Akard speaking on behalf of Hank and himself explained our option as Convention hosts to award recognitions in the form of \$100 checks and certificates of accomplishment to the Comm/Info Professional Of The Year and the Air Traffic Controller Of The year. The Board agreed to perpetuate these awards each year. E. D. Sauer called for an adjournment until our September 2007 convention in Las Vegas, which followed with motion and agreement. With special respect to our members, Bob Akard, Executive Secretary.

MEMBERSHIP BUSINESS MEETING

Sept. 30, 2006 Covington, KY

Executive Director Hank Sauer brought our membership's 30th annual meeting to order. He then called upon Gil Kania to offer inspirational thoughts. Gil held a minute of silence for each member to meditate in his or her own manner. Hank then gave special recognition to Eileen Kania and Barbara Morabito for their hard industrious effort and successes in selling tickets for our 50/50 drawing.

Hank then asked Membership Director Maginnis for a membership report. Mac appealed for members not having done so, to please execute the member's USAF profile form and return it to him to help us comply with laws governing tax free military organizations. He gave a demographic profile of our current membership, emphasizing our roster losses due to aging members. We dropped 200 members last year, and our dues structure suggests a few more than that this year from our 2,350 active at this time. He discouraged delinquent dues payments.

Treasurer Ray Sharpless followed with a report of his past year's duties. The planned systematic movement of our cash assets from Armed Forces Bank to Belton Bank in Belton, MO is about complete. Our average CD rates are now nationally competitive as they cycle for renewal. Ray as BX manager gave an analysis of our volume of sales and popular inventory items. He also gave support to our program to give from the inventory a free ball cap to each first time reunion attendee.

Hank asked Bob Akard to present his program. Bob called for and received motions to approve the minutes of the 2005 Business Meeting in Overland Park, KS as published in the Nov. 2005 Communicator. A motion followed for those present to approve the change in our By-Laws to have nominees for any Board position to be channeled first to the Nominating Committee. There being no discussion, the proposal passed. Next was the introduction of the 2007 Convention to be held in Las Vegas at the Circus-Circus Hotel on weekdays starting Tuesday, Sept.25, 2007 and concluding Friday the 28th at favorable weekday rates of \$65. Bob introduced the three men present who will be a team hosting this reunion. The primary host is Chris Miller who is assisted by Bill Mosley and Andy Agan. As Chair of the Fiscal Management and Audit Committee, Bob gave a state of our financial condition report for the past four years. It was explained to all the need to have enough cash assets to cover the total cost of a newly contracted convention, which usually averages in the mid forty thousands. With this understood, and coupled with the semi-annual Communicator publications, we are carrying the needed cash assets. For the past four years this total has been stable, with 2003 being \$70,138 and 2006 being \$66,549. Keep in mind our \$5,000 contribution for Katrina relief for enlisted men's families at Keesler AFB giver to the AF Relief Fund. As chair of this committee, and working with the ingenuity of Treasurer Sharpless, we have witnessed an increased ratio of CD's to total cash assets from 54% to 82%. Bob reported an interim and spontaneous audit of select Board members' expenses and found no exceptions to our Fiscal management and Audit Manual.

Hank Sauer reiterated the continuity of programs, stability of leadership, and purposes of camaraderie still existing since the founding of AACS-AA in 1977. He feels the management and membership participation will continue to keep us strong for the future.

At this point all first time attendees were summoned to the front to receive their complimentary ball cap from Ray Sharlesses BX stock. Roaring applause followed showing our warm welcome to them.

The Nominating Committee was then asked to present for membership confirmation the re-election of Stan Phillips, Bill Bethea and Gen, Prather to their respective Board positions. Those members present approved.

Hank introduced our invited guest, Col. Bill Malec, Chief Of Airspace and Airfield Ops Division, Headquarters Air Mobility Command, to give us an update of Air Traffic Control in today's USAF. His visual and verbal explanations were informative and appreciated.

Our traditional memorial service for those members or spouses missing roll call the past year was conducted by Gen. Prather and assisted by Mac Maginnis. Each name was read just following a brief service by Gen. Prather. Our Sgt. At Arms, Bill Bethea, presented the bugle TAPs.

E. D. Sauer concluded the 2006 AACS-AA Business Meeting with adjournment until September 2007 in Las Vegas.



Greene was transferred to Lowry Field for clerk typist school. Upon graduation I was assigned to the 59th AACS Group in Anchorage, Alaska from April 1948 - Sept 1948. A photo of that entire group is posted on the web. While in Alaska I joined Special Services and traveled TDY to Nome, Ladd Field, Port Whitter, Marks AFB, Ft Richardson, Kodiak and a few other sites. As property manager for the play "Arsenic and Old Lace‰ I also played the role of Mr. Witherspoon. The 59th changed to 1804th Hq 1804th AACS Gp Anchorage Alaska in Sept 1948 when the USAF was established. I was sent TDY by AACS to Adak, Cold Bay, Thornbrough AFB, Cape AFB and Davis AFB.

From Alaska to the Pentagon - I was transferred to the 1908th AACS Sq Washington, DC (Pentagon) in Jan 1950 and in Nov 1950 the 1908 AACS Sq was changed to the 1061st Comm Sq. While in the Pentagon, AACS switched from torn tape teletype to continuous tape and I was one of the team that traveled TDY to Maxwell AFB Ala, Dayton OH, Carswell AFB TX & McClellan AFB CA to implement standardize switching operations. These were the major communication centers in the USA for the USAF. The Pentagon call sign was JEP.

From the Pentagon to Germany - In August 1951 I was transferred to Germany on the U.S.N.S. Gen. W. C. Langfitt. At that time I had 38 months Foreign Service credit while returning servicemen were being sent back to the USA <from WW II> if they had 36 months of Foreign Service. I was assigned to the 25th Comm Sq Wiesbaden, Germany (USAFE) from Aug 1951 until Feb 1952. During that period I got TDY to Munich & Neubiberg/Ramersdorf for temporary housing for my wife and daughter.

In Feb 1952, the 25th Comm Sq (USAFE) became the 54th Comm Sq (USAFE) until September 1953. During that time I was sent TDY to Munich to the Siemens & Halske company with 1st It. Ross to approve the switching TTY equipment for Kaiserslautern. In September 1953 the 25th Comm Sq was designated the 2005th AACS Sq Wiesbaden, Germany (USAFE) and in Oct 1953 the 2005th AACS Sq moved to Kaiserslautern, Germany. I was the last TTY Station Chief at Wiesbaden and the First TTY Station Chief at Kaiserlaughen. I was assigned to the 2005th until December 1953 when I was transferred to the 1807th AACS Wg in Furstenfeldbruck. I lived in Wessling before base housing. During my tour of duty with the 1807th AACS Wg I was sent TDY to The 1815th AACS Gp in Rabat, French Morocco and to the 1975th AACS Sq at Sidi Slimane AB, Fr. Moc, for coordination activities on the AIRCOMNET.

The Wing moved in November 1955 and since I was scheduled to rotate back to the USA in Dec, so the last 30 days were in the 1282nd AACS Sq in Furstenfeldbruck, Germany; which operated the control tower where the bad guys killed the Olympic athletics a few years later. Interesting note: I was only assigned to five different AACS outfits (but nine different organizational unit numbers).

While in Europe I also got leave to Amsterdam, London, Salzburg, Innsbruck & Vienna, Austria, Venice, Rome & Naples, Italy and Zurich, Switzerland; among others. My Son Donald Michael was born in Furstenfeldbruck, Germany. I finished my 48 month European tour in 51 months. Enjoyed every minute!!

I entered OCS in January 1956 as a T/Sgt and stayed on active duty in AC&W squadrons until 1961, when I was switched to SAC and the Minuteman Missile Program until I retired on September 1, 1967.

WAOWEO is my amateur Radio call sign but I've been off air for a few years now.





Most of us who were stationed at Munich Riem Airport consider it our best and most memorable assignment.

During the 1949-1952 time frame, we had approximately 225-250 personnel stationed at Riems. The majority of the personnel were in the age group of 18-22 and we thought of ourselves as "really something". With Munich Riems being the major commercial airport for Munich, we had "no guns, no gates and no guards"...The terminal & the administration buildings must have had 10 or more ways to get in and out. You can bet that there were lots of comings and goings around the clock. On a more serious note, we did run the Southern Germany Air Route Traffic Control Center, a Weather Switch Central and a flight check operation.



Do you understand what the flag draped coffin really means?


The following is how to understand the flag laid upon a coffin and how it is surrendered to so may survivors of a veteran's family.

Do you know that at military funerals, the 21-gun salute stands for the sum of the numbers in the year 1776?



Have you ever noticed the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the United States of America Flag 13 times? You probably thought it was to symbolize the original 13 colonies, but we learn something new every day!

The 1st fold of the flag is a symbol of life.

Please see AACS Special Order 200.6, dated 23 April 1945, issued by the 65th AACS Group. In April of 45 I visited a Holocaust Camp that Gen Eisenhower had under guard for his Generals to see. They let me go through. On my return to Paris, Dux Ledoux gave me a copy of the this Special Order, which authorized the Bronze **Service Star Ribbon for the Northern France** Campaign. Because of the horror I witnessed at the camp, I suffered some kind of Post Hypnotic Stress and erased the visit to the camp from my memory and the Special Order that I was given. Years later, my Grandson married into a Jewish Family and their discussions about their losses in the camp brought my visit all back, 61 years later. I found the Special Order in my 201 File and was shocked. I contacted some of the people I know who were on the order and not one of them knew about the order. I think the initial classification of SECRET was part of the problem. I contracted Bruce Hilton, Mary Green Gordon and Glenn Turner. There may be others on the Special Order who are members and do not know about it. Thanks much and I hope to make the 2006 AACS Convention/Reunion in Covington, KY.







Retired NCO lobbies for Bronze Star plate

A retired Air Force NCO who authored a bill for Colorado to issue Bronze Star license plates to medal holders saw Governor Bill Owens sign it in Denver June 5.

The other half of the battle seems to be getting the word out. The Bronze Star Medal is the fourth highest award an individual can receive for bravery, heroism or meritorious service.

There are tens of thousands of retired military people and active duty people in the area and thousands more throughout the state. Many Bronze Star

Medal holders are among them.

"Do you realize how many local retired military personnel visit local Air Force bases to use the base exchanges and commissaries just on a weekly basis?" said retired Air Force Master Sgt. Joe Duffy from his home in Colorado Springs. "We were able to recognize these particular veterans who are among the best of the best, for their combat performance during the many conflicts from World War II up to and including the present conflicts."

It was the same Joe Duffy, the retired communications NCO, who parlayed his skills from the Air Force to decades of service as a State news I am passing on."

Department foreign service employee and communications professional, who stood near as the Colorado governor signed Senate Bill 028.

The man who has 43 years of government service, who is eligible for induction into the Air Force Communications and Information Hall of Fame until 2012, was shying away from any mention of himself for weeks after the bill was signed.

I want this information passed on to our Bronze Star Medal Colorado veterans," said the Vietnam veteran who retired from government service in 1997. "It isn't about me. It is about the news I am passing on."

How many of you personally remember the B10 and B18? As Regional Control Officer, 1st Lt Bowman set about getting some perks for the enlisted communicators and controllers, flying pay being one of the first. Bowman was usually at the controls.

One incident involved the B10. We were approaching landing and Bowman pointed down to the crystal clear water and there in the brilliant sunshine under the surface was a perfect outline of a B10, which had obviously undershot the runway. This was the airplane used in the 1934 flight to Alaska. It was led by "Hap" Arnold and according to Louis Shores book on, "Highways in the Sky," Harold McClelland, Wally Smith, Ivan Farman and Walter Berg were major participants.

Another occasion involved the B18. We were approaching the old Pittsburg airport runway which has a solid wall to clear for the runway. A Major had signed on as co-pilot to get in his flying time. I filled in as radio operator. I saw Bowman reach across and grab the gear control. Some pointed words were had by a 1st Lt to a Major, after we got out of the airplane.

In the late 1930's as I recall it, Haskell E (Hack) Neal was a buck Sgt. at Pope Field, N.C. Pope Field was a member station on the Eastern Seaboard Air Alert Net as was Langley Field, Va., where we were stationed. This net of stations became the AACS 2nd Region.

In early February of 1942, shortly after Pearl Harbor orders were issued for AACS personnel to proceed to Washington, D, C. to form the 13 Army Airways Communications Squadron for the purpose of relieving Pan American Airways (Communications) in Africa. Wendell W. Bowman had risen to the rank of Colonel and was the Commanding Officer. Haskell E. (Hack) Neal was commissioned in Washington and rose to the Rank of Lt Col. in Africa. He succeeded Col Wendell W. Bowman as Commander of the 13th. Bowman returned to the states to Hq's AACS in Ashville, N.C.

After having served as Station Chief of five different stations in Africa followed by one in the US, I was discharged and regretfully my association with Wendell W. Bowman came to an end.







We refer to saluting when we do the pledge to the flag, when the National Colors pass or are presented, when the National Anthem or honors are played, or when taps are played and firing squads or guns render honors. We got MOAA magazine to ask veterans what they preferred, hand over the heart or saluting. When last I looked, some 583 veteran respondents had voted 81% in favor of the salute. In addition, my email address was in the questionnaire and I've had about 150 responses, with all but a dozen or so in favor of the salute. Obviously an overwhelming majority of the veterans want to salute.

There are no regulations telling us veterans what we can and can't do in this matter. If we decide we want to salute, who will dare to tell us "no"?

It is a matter of personal choice. We've earned the right to render a salute. Now the challenge is to get the word out. I believe the unit and branch associations are the best way. The commanders of the American Legion and VFW never answered my emails, presuming they even got them. If we can get this started it will take on a life of its own. Those who object can continue the hand over the heart thing. Gradually the custom will change, as well it should.

Just imagine thousands of fans saluting at NFL, MBA, and Major League Baseball games when the National Anthem is played. It will telegraph a message to all others of how many have served this country in the Armed Forces---it will be a positive and patriotic message.

You can help by putting the word out in your organizations, which are made up of patriots like you and me. Thanks, my friend.



Life & Regular Membership is based on service (men and women) as a commissioned officer, warrant officer, non-commissioned officer, enlisted or civilian, who has served or is serving in any communications/information or air traffic control unit or holds or held a MOS, AFSC or other skill identifier as a communicator/information, air traffic controller or support skill in any Air Force Major Air Command (AACS, ACS, AFCS, AFCC, AFC4A, AFCA, AFFSA, SAC, TAC, ADC, USAFSS MAC, etc., or the current commands) Spouses of a surviving member are also eligible for Regular membership. The Life Membership of a deceased member will transfer to the surviving spouse unless he/she requests otherwise. Associate Membership is subject to the approval of the Alumni Associations Executive Board for individuals who actively supported any communications/information or air traffic control activity, but otherwise does not meet the criteria for Life or Regular Membership. Associate Members are not eligible to vote or to hold office in the Association, but are treated like all other members.

Regular and Associate Membership dues are \$10.00 per-year, payable in two-year increments. TO: THOSE POTENTIAL MEMBERS OF THE AACS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION!

QUESTION: WHO OR WHAT IS THE AACS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION?

ANSWER: An Association that is comprised of over 2,200 members who began their service in the Army Air Force before WWII and who served in the first dedicated communications element to provide communications and air traffic control as its primary mission and members who have served since then in any communications or air traffic control unit, including those serving today. This new Army Air Force organization, was formed in 1938 and was named the "Army Airways Communications System" (AACS). During WWII, it was renamed the "Air Communications Service" (ACS) and placed under the then "Air Transport Command" and within months was renamed once again to the "Airways and Air Communications Service" (AACS). In 1961, AACS was elevated to a Major Air Command and renamed "Air Force Communications Service" (AFCS). In 1979, the name was changed to "Air Force Communications and AFCC was downsized and renamed the "Air Force was undergoing major reorganizations and realignment of functions and AFCC was downsized and renamed the "Air Force Communications Agency" (AFCA) which is still an active Air Force organization. Also in the early 1990's, the Air Force created the "Air Force Flight Standards Agency" (AFFSA) and reassigned air traffic control responsibilities to this new Agency.

Over the years since the AACS Alumni Association was formed (1977) the membership criteria changed from individuals who only served in AACS units, to include all communicators/information/air traffic control and support skills regardless of what Major or Joint Command an individual served in, including today's active duty personnel.

Because of the heritage of the letters "AACS" and its unique contributions to long-haul communications and air traffic control, the Association has decided to maintain "AACS" as our organizational name. This could change in the future as our members who served from 1938 to 1961 are added to our "Missed Roll Call" list, and a new organizational name becomes more appropriate.

While the answer above is long, the short answer is "any individual who served or is serving in any Air Force Communications or Air Traffic Control unit, in any skill set, from 1938- to today, "is" the AACS Alumni Association.

The AACS motto of "Fellowship in the Company of Equals" is more than just words, but the glue that holds us all together through the different decades. The AACS Alumni Association is comprised of about 85% enlisted personnel and 15% officers, which includes over 50 General Officers, active and retired.
