



The 2010 Cost for the web site was \$359.40 (most work is done by the Editor/Publisher).



Bob Spence, at bob1sp@msn.com makes the following claim: I would like to stake my claim to being one of the only, if not the only E4(Then known as buck sergeants) to be dispatched to

dismantle an AACS station. In the fall of 1949 I and a group of Newfoundland civilians was ordered to Marak Point Greenland, with the purpose of recovering as much usable equipment as possible. My mission was to get as much of the AACS gear and theirs was to recover the heavy equipment and vehicles. We had an LST waiting for us to use as quarters while we were there and to transport the stuff back to BW 1. I have a number of pix of the trip including one of the LST high and dry on the beach.

Marak Point was known as BW 4 during WW2. It was an emergency landing strip located about halfway between BW8 and BW1. Due to vagaries in the weather in that part of the world, it took several tries to make it in. I had some scary trips.



User Name: afcommatc (all lower case letters)

Password: mpn1aacs (all lower case, with a number ONE after the "n")

REMEMBER TO PROTECT THE USER NAME AND PASSWORD AND DENY ACCESS TO UNAUTHORIZED **PERSONNEL**

You need Adobe Reader and/or MS WORD to read or download to your computer. If you do not have Adobe Reader, there is a link to Adobe.com so you can download a free copy. We felt that we can allow more members to read or download the Membership Roster using the PDF format as it is the "de-facto" internet standard and that the Adobe Reader program can be downloaded free. You can use the PDF OR WORD EDIT/FIND functions to find names, units, etc, on the Membership Roster. The Communicators are in a PDF format only as that is the format we have use to have the Communicators printed. We now have Communicators archived on the web site staring in June 2006. The November 2006 issue is **not** available due to a alitch on our part.

> READ AND FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR DOWNLOADING. (Remember to RIGHT Click to get the "SAVE TO Menu")

SUGGEST before you start, you may want to FIRST create a folder on your hard drive and name it "Membership Roster" and/or "Communicators". When you are inputting the downloading instructions, name the file "Membership Roster" and/or "Communicator" and then download to the folder you have created...this way, each time you download the roster or communicator, it will ask you if you want to replace the existing file....the answer is YES. This will save disk space and only store the current roster/communicator on your computer (unless you want to save multiple copies).

WE WILL CONTINUE TO MAIL COMMUNICATORS TO ALL MEMBERS, UNLESS YOU NOTIFY WALT MCLAIN (aacsmbrship@comcast.net) or HANK SAUER (diraacs@comcast.net) to remove your name from the mailing list. The victim's family was suddenly in crisis. I wonder how they have been able to deal with it? One of our own shared with me how he lost his wife after 17 years of a great marriage; another is gradually losing his wife to Alzheimer's; she is slowly but surely slipping away. These comrades along with that Myrtle Beach family fully understand what constitutes a crisis.

How does one react to crisis? Many who live their lives without God very often are the same people who blame God when confronted with crisis. Why didn't

God intervene? They may believe He exists, but they have failed to know Him. The irony is, most often they would resent it if God attempted to interfere with their daily life. Older guys would recall the instant belief which often occurred in a foxhole, but was quickly forgotten later. Of course there can be no answers to crisis other than the fact that it is the price of being given free will which all too often throughout the ages has been badly abused by people just like us. God does not provide every answer; and most likely we wouldn't care much for His answers if He did!

But for those who seek to know God on a regular, faithful basis there is an assurance that God does care, that He offers comfort and eventual peace to help alleviate any and every crisis situation. Chief Travis was named one of TIME's 100 most influential people.

Chief Master Sergeant Tony Travis By CHESLEY "SULLY" SULLENBERGER Thursday, Apr. 29, 2010



When chief master sergeant Antonio "Tony" Travis arrived at the Port-au-Prince airport shortly after January's earthquake, there was only one usable runway, the air-traffic-control tower was structurally unsafe, and 42 aircraft were grounded in a space designed for 12. Time was of the essence: the Haitians were in dire need of supplies that had to be brought in by air, but the damage meant that far fewer planes could be accommodated.

In only 28 minutes, Chief Travis set up a makeshift air-traffic-control operation located midfield. Working from a card table, often standing on chairs, he and his team deftly took control of the arrivals and departures. Under his leadership,

planes were able to take off and land every five minutes, bringing in 4 million lb. of supplies. For Haitians unable to get to the capital, his team surveyed and controlled four remote drop zones, providing 150,000 bottles of water and 75,000 packaged meals to people who had no other means of survival.

Dear Hank:

The letter from Bob Bush sounded something like my AACS experiences.

After graduating ROM school in Sioux Falls and not qualifying for air crew I was sent to Truax Field, WI to train as a CTO. After graduation in Nov. 1943 I and many of my school mates began a gypsy like tour of the U.S. from Smyrna, TN to McClellan Field, CA where we became part of AACS to Jefferson Barracks, St.Louis to Patrick Henry, VA where we shipped overseas in a huge convoy on April 1, 1944. First we headed to the North Atlantic and icebergs then back south with part of our convoy leaving for England, Then through the Mediterranean where on April 20th, coincidentally Hitler's birthday we were attacked by more than 20 planes off the coast of Algeria. I had volunteered to assist the Navy Armed Guard on a 20 m.m. A.A gun and all forty of us volunteers were on alert with the gun crew, I had left my gun to go up to the top deck for coffee and on finishing I decided to take a shortcut on a ladder over the side of the ship. As I began to climb down I heard guns firing and at first thought it was practice when a ship about 1000 yards away suddenly exploded in flames. At the time we all thought it was a gasoline tanker because it virtually disappeared. I grabbed hold of the ladder with both hands because I was afraid that the concussion would blow me off the ladder. When it came it shook me violently and my leg was cut by a piece of medal. Then I climbed back up and returned to my gun. All of the armed ships were firing their big guns into the air and tracers from 20mm.40mm and machine guns filled the sky. The firing lasted about an hour or less. We heard booms in the distance but did not see any other hits.

Years later, through the internet I found out the ship that exploded was the S.S.Paul Hamilton and that 504 Air Force personnel, including pilots, air and ground crew technicians were lost as well as 76 Merchant Marine crew and Navy gunners in the greatest loss of life on any Liberty ship. Two other ships were sunk including the destroyer Lansdale with a loss of 67 lives, another freighter and two other ships that were beached in Algeria.

Except for a thwarted sub attack the next day that was the last of my WWII action. I ended up in Cairo where I was retrained as a point to point operator and then spent the remaining 20 months at bases in Habbaniya, Iraq, Abadan, Iran and Benghazi, Libya. When the war ended I did not have enough points for discharge because we never got a battle star as the Navy did and I never considered my leg injury for a Purple Heart both of which would have put me over the top for discharge,


This turned out to my favor as I got to fly home for reassignment instead of shipping home on a transport. When I got to the U,S, they decided to discharge us anyway. One other note, because of bad weather in Bermuda our plane was redirected to Newfoundland. That was the same day that the Navy squadron of three planes disappeared over the Bermuda Triangle.






John Thomasson, 139th AACS Sq Was with the 2nd Group to land in Japan at the end of WWII (He was at the Kanoya Radio Site)

If you see fit to print the enclosed, it would be much appreciated. I don't expect I'll make mint off the book, but I would like to share it with those interested enough to read it





I am enclosing a few pictures taken at each of the bases on which I was stationed. They include Payne Field, Cairo, Egypt where I was transformed from a CTO to a point to point operator, Habbaniya Airport, Iraq, RAF Staging Post 40, Abadan Army Air Base, Iran and Merrifield Field, Benghazi, Libya.

The first picture is in the control tower at Abadan where it probably was 110 degrees, and the guy on the right is Pete Peterson and an unknown tower operator. April 1945.

The next shot is the Abadan tower and terminal building. Same date as above.

Next is a group of us who had just played touch football at Habbaniya. It was in the fall and the weather had cooled down. In the front from the left, Sgt. Mcfarland whom I later looked up in his home in Kokomo, Indiana, next is Sgt. Rickert from PA, Lt. Morrison, Sgt. Len Mantell from NYC. In the back row from the left is Pfc. Gershman from Chicago, Sgt. Petravage from PA who later was accepted for Infantry OCS, Pfc. Ostiller from Chicago, Cpl. Mueller from WI and Cpl. Yanak from WV. Petravage had been a coal miner and Yanak, an electric lineman who lost all of his hair in an electrical accident. About Nov. 1945

I have news concerning MIAS as written in Sept. 2007 issue of VFW magazine, "Every Day is Like Memorial Day" written and reported by Robert Widener.

I am somewhat tardy in passing this on to The Communicator but it's the best I can do being of advanced age and suffering with severe arthritis.

My reason for giving you this info is to possibly enlighten some of my fellow comrades who were aware of the MIA that I will describe and are probably not aware of its discovery.

In the 2007 issue of the VFW magazine a small description of a wrecked B25 was found in 1999 in Irian Jaya (formerly Dutch New Guinea). This was one chance in a million that it was one of our squadron planes but I felt that it was the one that was lost in 1945 with a crewman that I personally knew. Sensing this, I e-mailed a letter to Mr. Widener and he responded as you will see in the accompanying copies of my correspondence.

If you would include this in an issue of The Communicator it would be greatly appreciated. The enclosures will tell the story.

Hazardous Duty

Some missions can prove difficult due more to the terrain than politics. During a 1999 WWII recovery mission to Irian Jaya, the country forming the western portion of the island of New Guinea, Byrd's team was working at a high altitude to excavate a site where a B-25 had crashed with eight crew members aboard.

"That site was at 13,000 feet," Byrd said, adding that he had to learn how to rappel of The www.recked I aircraft was

perched on the edge of a cliff, and we had to be tied in to work there. One of the team members had altitude sickness and went into shock."

Team members can be exposed to a multitude of dangers in and around a site. Typical of most missions, a work force from the local population is employed to do much of the digging. These willing workers provide another benefit with their knowledge of the area's hazards, such as the treacherous "two-step" snake in Vietnam—a green pit viper so nicknamed because when it strikes, that's as far as you get before you die.

But a much larger threat is unexploded ordnance. Laos in particular has a high number of such explosives, making missions there especially dangerous. In fact, it's estimated that 200 Laotians are killed each year by ordnance left over from the war.

"During the first-mission I was on, there was a bomb crater with two 2.75-inch rockets just lying there by our LZ and work site," Taylor said. The team was pulled back while the explosive ordnance disposal tech moved the rockets to a safe area.

Some missions test the mettle of team members more than others. During the Tibet operation, team members did all he digging because the site was in a remote area, far from any local population. As a result, fatigue hampered the team, but taking a break was out of the question.

"There was no point in giving anyone time off because all you could do was sit there in your tent with wet clothing," Pokines said. With the snow line moving further down the mountain each day, the team decided to push hard to wrap up the mission as quickly as they could, he said.

Safety for team members is always a top concern (see sidebar), but tragedies can occur. On April 7, 2001, a helicopter transporting team members crashed 280 miles north of Hanoi. Seven Americans and nine Vietnamese were killed. The group was an advance party investigating possible excavation sites. It's a wound still felt today by those at JPAC.

Rewarding Work

Despite long hours and sometimes living out of a pup tent at a base camp, or

putting up with rain that may last most of the day, team members find the work extremely rewarding. For Byrd, it was just as his Special Forces friend had suggested.

"Every one of these cases involves a story about a serviceman who is missing, and there's a reason why they're missing," he said. "And for every one of them, there's someone out there who wonders what happened to him."

One of the air crewmen whose remains Byrd had helped recover from the Irian Jaya mission turned out to be from North Carolina. The airman's sister wrote to him after reading a local newspaper account of the recovery for which Byrd was interviewed.

"I still have the letter ... it means a lot to me," he said. "She wrote that people might think that after 70 years we have forgotten about them, but it was just as real now as it was then. She said they never stopped wondering what happened to him, and if he was ever going to come home."

For Taylor, doing his part to help resolve the fate of MIAs helps him connect to men in his command who were killed during his time in Iraq, as well as a classmate who died there.

"My unit got back from Iraq in August 2004," he said. "I lost soldiers I commanded, and it means a lot to do these missions."

Alexander related her feelings about the missions to her Navy aviation background.

"Being a pilot, and my husband is a pilot, and a lot of the people we're looking for were air crew," she said. "I would want to know someone was looking for me, or my husband, as long as it took. And I think that's awesome that we can do that for the families."

Stiglich says every day he would remind team members at a site why they were there: "These guys we're looking for have been laying there for 30 to 40 years, and we're only out here for 45 days. We owe it to them, and to their families."

Summing it up simply, he said: "Every day is like Memorial Day."

The 1917th AACS Marion Transmitter Station "AUN"

Arriving at the 1917th AACS Air Force radio station AUN in Marion Massachusetts close to Cape Cod, in June of 1950, I was greeted by beautifully landscaped grounds with four buildings dominated by an enormous set of antenna wires supported over 400 feet in the air by fourteen 440 feet high cylindrical guyed iron towers covering a field over1,000 feet wide by 5,000 feet long. One of the buildings housed single enlisted personnel, each with his own private room, and one large building in the rear housed the radio transmitting equipment. The equipment had been designed in the last decade of the 19th century and the Alexanderson Alternator transmitter was built for RCA by the GE in 1908. This transmitter used a 600 horsepower electric motor to rotate a large notched flywheel spinning through electric coils, producing a radio signal that was fed through magnetic amplifiers to an outside coil house and up to the enormous antenna array. Transoceanic radiograms were sent from the Marion station using Morse code to radio receivers in the Scandinavian countries. Replies were received at a station in Chatham Massachusetts. The Navy took control of the station from RCA during World War II then returned it. RCA eventually decided the station was no longer needed and so the Air Force acquired it for various tests, one of these was sending radio teletype weather data to submarines in the North Atlantic by agreement with the Navy.

The 250 KW transmitter, the most powerful on Earth, was designed to transmit at 25.62 KC. The frequency was fixed by the flywheel and another 9 KC flywheel was in storage. All electrical controls, except the telegraph key, and electrical meters were located on three contiguous heavy slate power panels each about ten feet high by six feet wide. The items controlled with panel included the alternator, the liquid rheostats, and the cooling pumps. The cooling pumps circulated water through the alternator field coils to the outside cooling pond. The telegraph key controlled the magnetic amplifiers and the motor secondary current via relays. The output power of the alternator was affected by weather conditions, and the operator had to make adjustments as the weather changed. Nominal output was about 5 KW leakage on key up and 250 KW key down. On a wet quiet foggy day, output could exceed 300 KW as the antenna wires sagged above the damp ground. Output control weather variables included wind, rain, snow, sleet, ice accumulation on the wires, and temperature effects on the wires. The station required only one person on duty at any time.

The Alternator Antenna System

The antenna itself was an array of 28 wires 5,000 feet long suspended over 400 feet above the ground and directed toward the Northeast. There were 2 parallel rows of 6 towers, the rows being 1,000 feet apart and the 6 towers in each row were spaced 1,000 feet apart. The other 2 towers were located at each end mid way between the rows. Heavy cable spring stays with large bell shaped insulators linked the towers across the rows, and from each spring stay 28 insulators each about 8 feet long were suspended and they in turn supported the antenna wires

Antenna Maintenance

To keep the antenna system in top operating condition, a team of between twelve and fourteen riggers performed full time year round maintenance on the antenna towers and wires. The iron towers were always protected with suitable paint and their supporting anchor wires were always coated with protective grease.. When the alternator was running, the riggers were confined below the 100 foot level, and, they had to be grounded through a heavy copper band on one of their ankles. When the alternator was operating, a near lethal static charge could build up on a person working on the towers. All other operations were carried out with the alternator shut down. With the lift cable tied to a pickup truck which backed up the riggers rode a bosun's chair up the towers supported by that single cable to perform work at all levels. No one was ever killed or even injured in the risky maintenance operations, but OSHA, if it had existed at this time, in words of the current vernacular "would have had a baby"

Operating the Alexander Alternator

The cooling water pumps were then turned on. Power was then applied to a high volume blower system, the alternator motor primary and to the two speed control rheostats. The rheostats were large tanks containing a salt brine pumped across a weir. Inside of the tank was a series of copper pipes

arranged like organ pipes, and as the weir height changed, so did their electrical resistance in the wires carrying current to the electric motor. One controlled the motor primary and the other the motor secondary. The primary weir was used to bring motor speed up to a specific value which defined the operating frequency. The secondary weir was initially set at the same height as the primary. With key up, current not flowing through the secondary rheostat, the magnetic amplifiers detuned, approximately 5 kilowatts would radiate from the antenna array. The alternator system was now almost ready for radio transmission..

Depressing the telegraph key controlled two operations taking a few milliseconds: one, to tune the magnetic amplifiers, and two, to close three massive relays that short circuited the motor secondary through the secondary rheostat. When the magnetic amplifiers went into tune, the alternator tried to radiate 250 or more kilowatts of output power. The motor tried to stop it instantly, but by short circuiting the secondary, an additional 300 KW or more, depending on antenna position, was fed into the motor to keep its speed constant. The transmission gears between motor and flywheel would howl under the load change and the operator would quickly adjust the secondary weir to stabilize the system so the motor speed stayed constant whether the telegraph key was up or down. When the key went up, the magnetic amplifiers detuned, the relays opened to break the secondary electrical connection and the primary kept the motor speed constant, all taking place in a few milliseconds. One of the loudest units in the system was the blower that cleared the arcs drawn when on key up the three large five pound copper contacts flew open breaking several hundred amperes of current to the motor secondary. These greenish yellow arcs resulting from the burned copper were blown up creating a great greenish display through the windows making our building look like Dr. Frankenstein's laboratory in full swing.

The Purpose of the Test

The test was to send weather reports to the submarines in the North Atlantic by teletype not morse code. The alternator was designed for a maximum of 60 word per minute morse code. Normally radio teletype at 60 words per minute requires about four times more "key" breaks, therefore, the submarine teletype receivers were adjusted to 15 words per minute. After months of teletype receiver adjustment, it became clear that the teletypes were incapable of operating at less than its design speed. The project was to be abandoned, but RCA agreed to take responsibility for the alternator and the test continued at 60 word per minute teletype. RCA believed that the equipment over 50 years old which had operated flawlessly for over 30 years could take the stress of about four times the maximum design value. The key fears were that the transmission gears may fail catastrophically or the large relays slamming closed and then opening 5 pound copper contacts 60 to 100 times per second would never work To everyone's surprise, the system continued to operate flawlessly for the next sixteen years. After I left the Air Force in 1952, I was told that, they dredged up an abandoned alternator from either Japan or Hawaii, and mounted it on the second base that was part of the original plan for two alternators. The entire system and antenna array was finally shut down and dismantled in about 1968, and thus the last of the operational large Alexander alternator systems entered the dustbin of history. Of the eighteen original alternators built in the first quarter of the 20th century, only the last one built in Sweden in 1924 remains and is located at Grimeton, Sweden. It is maintained there as a historical site by the UNESCO World Heritage Foundation. This antique is only fired up for demonstrations on very special occasions by the World Heritage Foundation.

"BLUETHENTHAL AFB IS ALIVE AND WELL"

Dear Sam,

I've just read P. 55 of the June 2010 Communicator, and I thought you might like to hear from another member of Sgt. Pope's detachment. AACS men at Bluethenthal were fast moving etransients in 1943, and so you may not remember me, but I arrived while you, and Sgts Smith, Voves and Griggs were still there. To fill in the next couple of chapters for you and Hank Sauer, I offer the following:

First, you are now hearing of Bluethenthal Field again from a guy who followed you in that AACS detachment. Sauer identifies the 413th Fighter Group, and mentions that "submarine patrols were flown from Bluethenthal."

The Anti-sub outfit was the 22nd Antisub Squadron of the First Air Force, headquartered at Mitchell Field on Long Island, a weird kind of unit with B25s, a B17 and a PBY5a (with an all-Navy crew headed by a pilot who was a Chief Petty Officer) patrolling the Outer Banks for subs daily in 1942 and 1943.

The trailblazing fight group was the 366th, most of whose pilots were fresh out of Aviation Cadets, transitioning from AT6s to P47s and learning their trade in the group that became famous in Europe as "Holt's Hun Hunters" (If you Google the Hunters, you'll get a better idea what they went on to do after D-Day and all across France.)

You may not have stayed around long enough to see VHF radio equipment installed in the tower, which got the code call sign "Pinetree" as soon as the VHF was operational. I went to Pope Field and Knollwood Field from Pinetree and then went to Europe shortly after the 101st Airborne shipped out. The first I've heard from Sgts Pope, you, Griggs, Smith or Voves is this story I'm looking at now.

I'm glad to see you still alive and kicking in 2010! Just keep on keeping' on!

I was a 760 radio operator assigned to DOT F of the 133rd. We landed on Omaha Beach later in July, 1944 and thereafter chased Patten's Third Army across France and Germany as far as the Czech border.

I believe we were the first AACS unit to cross the Rhine. Our COs were Lt. Hammond and later Captain Charles Koen.

Following VE day our station was located at an abandoned Luftwaffe AB a few miles from Munich.

Hope this information is of value to you.

Enclosed are some photographs (8) and explanation of same on the back. It is very important to my family that the photos be returned. I am enclosing a self addressed envelope for your convenience. Thank you.








CMSgt. Richard L. Etchberger will posthumously receive the nation's highest military tribute, the Medal of Honor, from President Obama on Sept. 21, the White House announced Friday. The President will recognize the conspicuous gallantry that Etchberger displayed in combat on March 11, 1968, when North Vietnamese soldiers overran Lima Site 85, a secret Air Force radar facility in the Laotian mountains. During the desperate battle, Etchberger, a ground radar superintendent, kept the enemy troops at bay with an M-16. His courageous action allowed seven of the 19 Americans there to be rescued, but Etchberger was mortally wounded as he boarded the rescue helicopter. Although he was posthumously awarded the Air Force Cross, the White House at the time declined to award him the Medal of Honor, as it did not want to attract attention to the presence of the clandestine US site in a supposedly neutral country. Etchberger's sons, Cory Etchberger, Richard Etchberger, and Steve Wilson will join the President at the White House for the award ceremony.

OUESTION: Who or what are we?

ANSWER: An Association that is comprised of over 2,200 members who began their service in the Army Air Corps and/or the Signal Corps before WWII and who served in the first dedicated communications element to provide communications and air traffic control as its primary mission and members who have served since then in any communications or air traffic control unit, including those serving today. This new Army Air Corps organization was formed in 1938 and was named the "Army Airways Communications System" (AACS). During WWII, it was renamed the "Air Communications Service" (ACS) and placed under the then "Air Transport Command" and within months was renamed once again as the "Airways and Air Communications Service" (AACS). In 1961, AACS was elevated to a Major Air Command and renamed "Air Force Communications Service" (AFCS). In 1979, the name was changed to Air Force Communications Command" (AFCC). In the early 1990's the Air Force was undergoing major reorganizations and realignment of functions and AFCC was downsized and renamed the "Air Force Command, Control, Communications & Computers Agency" (AFC4A) and shortly thereafter, was renamed the "Air Force Communications Agency" (AFCA). Also in the early 1990's, the Air Force created the "Air Force Flight Standards Agency" (AFFSA), and reassigned air traffic control responsibilities to this new Agency and to the Major Air Commands. In 2009, AFCA was renamed the "Air Force Integration Center" and placed under the AF Space Command along with the newly created 24th Air Force (for Cyber functions). Over the years since the AACS Alumni Association was formed (1977) the membership criteria changed from individuals who only served in AACS units, to include all communicators/information/cyber/air traffic control and support skills regardless of what Major or Joint Command an individual served in, including today's active duty personnel.

The motto of "Fellowship in the Company of Equals" is more than just words, but the glue that holds us all together through the different decades. The Association is comprised of about 85% enlisted personnel and 15% officers, which includes many General Officers, both active and retired.
