





Sergeant Martinez leads, supervises and mentors 35 personnel applying Federal Aviation Administration, United States Air Force and United Kingdom Air Traffic Control rules. She formulates and coordinates Air Traffic Control letters of agreement and operations letters with United Kingdom and United States Air Forces in Europe. Sergeant Martinez is entrusted with weather, communications, air traffic control simulators and automated systems valued in excess of \$9.2M.



Sergeant Martinez joined the Air Force in December 1992 and was assigned as an Inventory Management Apprentice. After four years, Sergeant Martinez cross trained into the Air Traffic Control career field. Her background includes experience as a Control Tower Watch Supervisor, Radar Approach Control Watch Supervisor, Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Air Traffic Control Training, Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Air Traffic Control Standardization and **Evaluations and Tower Chief Controller and Radar Approach Control Chief Controller.**

#### SENIOR AIRMAN JOHNNY B. LASTER JR.

Senior Airman Johnny B. Laster is a Tactical Network Operations Technician, 1st Combat Communications Squadron, Ramstein Air Base, Germany. He is responsible for the maintenance and deployment readiness of eight mobilized tactical communication network infrastructure and computer system suites worth \$3.7 million which are utilized to support 1,200 users and deployed commanders. The 1st Combat Communications Squadron provides combat-ready forces and equipment for Joint Task Force, Combined/Joint Air and Space Operations Center, Theater Air Base and tactical operations worldwide. Furthermore, the 1st Combat Communications squadron mobilizes and deploys communications and air traffic control systems for peacetime and wartime contingencies throughout Europe, Africa, Asia, and the Middle East in

support of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, U.S. European Command, U.S. Africa Command, U.S. Central Command and North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Senior Airman Laster entered the Air Force in February 2007 and immediately joined the Fire Fighter career field. Shortly after his tenure as a Fire Fighter Apprentice, Senior Airman Laster cross trained into the Voice Network Systems career field. His background includes Cisco switching and routing configurations, data cabling, telephone switching and network administration.

During his current assignment, Senior Airman Laster was deployed 102 days in support of Operations ODYSSEY DAWN and UNIFIED PROTECTOR during which he provided support to 1,400 North Atlantic Treaty Organization personnel allowing for 26,000 sorties which employed 291 weapons enabling the enforcement of a no-fly zone over Libya within 24 hours in accordance with United Nations Security Council Resolution 1973. While deployed in support of Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR, Senior Airman Laster and his team forward deployed command, control, communications, computers, and intelligence equipment supporting the relocation of \$33 million in intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance aircraft which was key in the destruction of 16 surface-to-air missile sites and 94 enemy command centers. Additionally, Senior Airman Laster mobilized tactical equipment enabling Combined Endeavor 2009 in Bosnia and Combined Endeavor 2010 in Romania.

## AF Communicators & Air Traffic Controllers Association 36th Annual Business Meeting - San Antonio, Texas

#### **September 22, 2012**

The following outline summarizes the Business Meeting:

The meeting was called to order by Executive Director (ED) Douglass Donnell, who then called for our Chaplain, Don Seeks, to give the invocation. Then followed the presentation of the colors followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Executive Secretary, Bob Akard asked the members to confirm the contents of the Business Meeting held in St. Louis in Sept, 2011 as they appeared in the Nov. 2011 Communicator. The minutes were confirmed.

Our Membership director, Walt McLain, explained the alarming decline in membership. Our primary source of new members continues to originate from our web-site. Walt appealed to all of us for recruitment, as a part of our obligation as concerned members.

Before introducing our Treasurer, ED Doug Donnell explained the basic soundness of the association's financial status. He explained the Board commitment the day before to come to next year's Board Meeting with financial plans to avoid further assets decline. Ideas being considered are recognizing Life Members who volunteer to become Contributing Life Members, the possible selling of limited advertisements in our two annual Communicators and to putting the November Communicator on the Web site, and not printing or mailing. Treasurer, Cindy Allison Explained our Assets Report for F/Y ending 06-30-12. This was followed by a review of the Income/Expenses Report for year 2012.

## AF Communicators & Air Traffic Controllers Association 36th Annual Board of Directors Meeting - San Antonio, Texas

#### September 22, 2012

Executive Director (ED) Doug Donnell opened the 36th annual Board Meeting with a statement of appreciation to the Board for its active participation during the past year conducting the needed business of the Association. Executive Secretary Bob Akard asked for approval of the minutes of last year's Board meeting in St. Louis as they appeared in the November issue of the Communicator. Board approved. There was no further old business brought forward. He then requested and received formal approval for a convention to be held on Sept. 18-22, 2013 in Knoxville, TN to be hosted by Hank Sauer and Bob Akard. This will be followed by a contract to be executed next week with the Marriott in Colorado Springs, CO on Sept. 24-28, 2014. Also, he requested approval of Ret. BGen Larry Dilda as nominee for the AFC&ATC Assoc Hall of Honor. Doug began a roll call of the Board to give their reports.

First was Vice Director Gerry Sonnenberg who explained his roll the past year toward learning and participating in the weekly electronically generated activities of the Board. He had no formal report to present.

Treasurer Cindy Allison presented copies of her annual Financial Statement and Assets Statement. She gave an elaboration on the pertinent figures, and expressed continued overall financial soundness of our situation. She updated the Board on the progress with the Knoxville CPA firm toward standardization and simplification of our annual IRS non-profit filings. Cindy gave concern about any further reduction of cash assets by weaknesses in expense control. Executive Secretary Bob Akard had no business but to continue in depth discussions of assets erosions, his abhorrence to deficit spending, and Board responsibility for budget planning as the planners and spenders. After many exchanges ED Donnell asked it be tabled until budget is called as a topic. BX Officer Bill Cassatt gave his progress of implementing computerizing inventory control, and explanation of new purchases and successes in convention and mail sales. His remarkable work was applauded by the Board.

Director of Membership Walt McLain reported the statistical facts on declining and present membership. He gave the numbers on expiring memberships for Jan. 2013, average expected new members, drop outs each year, and expected dues. Sgt-at-Arm Al Dumont was elected but was not present due to family crises. Susie Twedt was appointed as the Association Historian, replacing Gene Sheridan. Director of Information Gen. Gerry Prather had no formal report. At this point ED Doug Donnell resumed his agenda with the continuance of budget discussions. Following a member by member discussion, he then concluded that was no appreciable reduction of spending availing today for the current need for the membership. He proposed and gained approval for the ABOSLUTE development of hard numbers in Knoxville that will budget spending within income. We then had a brain storming cession on methods to obtain and retain membership. Among those were special recognition of Continuing Contributors as Life Members and selling of limited selective advertisements in our semi-annual Communicators. The Board meeting was then declared closed until Sept. 19, 2013 in Knoxville.

#### Robert (Bob) Mead's 1st 30 days Overseas?

I departed New York by Troop Ship at the end of August 1946 for Germany. We landed in

Bremerhaven, Germany the beginning of September. We got on a troop train that had a broken window and we boarded it up. It was a 3rd class car so we had fun!! It took us 2 days to get to Furstenfelldbruck AB, just outside of Munich. We stayed there 3 days and boarded a train for Paris. We spent the night in Paris and the next morning we left for Rome, Italy. We arrived in Rome just in time to go to bed. The next morning we left for Naples that had an AACS replacement depot. We stayed in Naples for two weeks before we got on a C-47 to Casablanca, Morocco which was the AACS Hg for the area. We stayed there for a couple of days and flew to Algeria. The Air Base was near a village called Maison Blanche (it is now the International Airport, about 25 miles from downtown, Algiers).

A 6X6 went into town each night and brought girls back to out base club. Our AACS outfit consisted of about 33 troops, our CO was a Lt Alpine and we had a Staff Sqt, but the rest of us were "P-ONS". The Casbah was in Algiers, which I visited often (You must have heard the old saying, "Take me back to the Casbah). This was a pretty nice tour of duty that lasted about 6 months until they closed the air base in early April 1947. We said good bye to the "Girls" and got on an AACS B-17 and flew to Germany (Faulbeuren) which was another AACS replacement depot. We just sat around and waited for an assignment. I was assigned to Munich Riem Airport about the time the Berlin Airlift started. I was assigned to the 1972nd AACS Squadron and in April 1949 they formed the 1812th AACS Group there to support the airlift bases. I rotated in November 1951 and was assigned to the 1917th AACS Sq, Westover AFB, MA.

#### An unusual GCA Save

#### Hank,

I see a couple of letters in the Communicator from pilots thanking GCA for an approach in bad weather. I thought that you might be interested in an approach where the pilot never knew that he was helped by GCA. In 1956 I was a radar repairman stationed with the 1274th AACS Squadron at Dreux AFB in France. We were operational from 0800 hours to 2400 hours except if there was an emergency request where we would contact the radar officer and wake up an operator. Normally we used the time from Midnight to 0800 for routine maintenance. We would often have time to just sit and talk. We usually had the tower frequencies on the radio. One night at around 0300 there was a call from a pilot who had lost his navigational equipment. He was requesting an ADF (Auto-Radio Direction Finding) approach. I looked at the screen and could see the plane flying the emergency triangular pattern. I could see that the plane was well beyond the ADF range. Windy, the control tower operator tried a couple of times to locate the plane but was unsuccessful. I quickly called the tower and told Windy that I had the plane on the scope and gave him the location. He gave the pilot commands as if it were an ADF approach and between us brought the plane into the base. Later, the pilot told the tower that this was the Best ADF approach he had ever made.





## 'Anytime, Anywhere!' 3rd Herd leaves its mark on Air Force history

5/30/2012 - TINKER AIR FORCE BASE, Okla. -- The unit shield is unmistakable, a sword intersected with four lightning bolts and the words "Live by the Sword" emblazoned underneath.

When the mantra "Anytime, Anywhere" is exclaimed by 721 combat communicators, it motivates every occupant in any auditorium, parade field or convention hall. The 3rd Combat Communications Group (CCG), affectionately known as the "3rd Herd," has lived by, and lived up to, these slogans for almost six decades as the one of the premier combat communications units in the Air Force.

Now, a new chapter in Air Force combat communications is being written as the service aligns and transforms its deployable communications capability with Air Force core competencies and capabilities required by a new defense strategy and constrained by a new fiscal environment. By prioritizing readiness over force structure, the Air Force announced in March 2012 that it will inactivate one of its two active duty combat communications groups, the 3rd CCG effective June 2013.

The Air Force will transform its ability to employ combat communications by posturing to seamlessly extend cyberspace, provide robust network operations and deliver resilient defense-in-depth to counter adversaries. Ultimately, the changes will result in a lighter, leaner, and more capable combat communications force to support homeland defense operations, humanitarian support missions and overseas contingency operations.

While a bitter sweet event to the many warriors who have passed through this storied unit, the Air Force will continue to provide excellent combat communications through its other active duty combat comm units, the 5th combat Communications Group, or the "5th Mob" located at Robins Air Force Base, Georgia, the 1st Combat Communications Squadron in Germany, and the 644th Combat Communications Squadron in Guam.

Since its inception, the 3rd Herd has continually supported theater and combatant commanders with deployable communications and systems. During the early part of its existence, air traffic control services were a significant portion of the group's mission/capability. As the expansion and importance of modern communications and networks progressed, the emphasis of the group moved toward providing core communications services and connectivity to the Global Information Grid in a deployed environment. Irrespective of the technology employed, personnel and equipment from the 3rd CCG have been on standby for immediate deployment for more than five decades. They have stood ready to deploy experts in networks, telephony, radio, satellite communications, radar, navigation systems, air traffic control, vehicle maintenance/operations, logistics, power production, and heating, ventilation, and cooling.

The men and women of the 3rd Herd have distinguished themselves in every major military conflict and humanitarian operation the United States has been involved in since the 1950s ... from operations in Vietnam to closing the final bases in Iraq during OPERATION NEW DAWN. While inactivating and leaving the responsibility of providing world-class combat communications and deployable air traffic control and landing systems services to the remaining combat communications units, it is appropriate to recognize some of the historic achievements of the 3rd Herd during the past 55 years of service to our nation.

#### **ORIGINS:**

Varying opinions abound on the true origins of the 3rd Herd--some say that the unit can trace its roots back to the 3rd Airways and Air Communications Mobile Squadron that was established at Tinker Air Force Base, Okla. on Dec. 1, 1952. The official record shows the true lineage is tied to the 3rd Communications Group, established on May 16, 1957 and activated on July 8, 1957 at South Ruislip, England, with the mission to provide communications services to 3rd Air Force. The 1960s saw

continuous fluctuations in the U.S. Air Force presence in the United Kingdom which eventually resulted in the inactivation of the unit on July 1, 1962. The 3rd was then reactivated and redesignated the 3rd Mobile Communications Group on May 20, 1964 and assigned to Tinker Air Force Base, Okla. on July 1, 1964. The disagreement on the 3rd's true origins stems from the July 1, 1964 inactivation of the 3rd Mobile Communications Squadron; some of the personnel transferred to the 3rd Mobile Communications Group while the actual unit lineage did not transfer. After several other designations, the group became the 3rd Combat Communications Group on Oct 1, 1986.

#### HISTORY:

Herdsman have deployed across the world to provide communications support to numerous military contingencies including Operation URGENT FURY (Grenada), Operation EAGLE LOOK (Southwest Asia), Operations DESERT SHIELD and DESERT STORM (Southwest Asia), Operation SOUTHERN WATCH (Southwest Asia), Operation DESERT CALM (Southwest Asia), Operation DESERT FOCUS/STRIKE (Southwest Asia), Operation PROVIDE COMFORT/NORTHERN WATCH (Turkey), Operation RESTORE HOPE (Somalia), Operation UPHOLD DEMOCRACY (Haiti), Operation PROVIDE PROMISE/DENY FLIGHT (Italy, Croatia) and Operation JOINT ENDEAVOR/GUARD (Bosnia, Italy, Croatia), Operation NEW HORIZONS (Peru), Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (Afghanistan), and Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (Iraq), and Operation NEW DAWN (Iraq).

Initial operations were critical to the cold war strategy of containment and supporting 3rd Air Force in Europe as the backstop against the Soviet Union. As the unit transitioned to Tinker Air Force Base, the mission evolved to deploy in the U.S. or abroad to support combat and humanitarian operations or provide emergency restoral of services.

By 1967, military use of satellites became a reality. In November 1968, under a project entitled the Initial Defense Communications Satellite Program, the then 3rd Mobile Communications Group proved the feasibility of the first mobile ground satellite communications terminal a capability which combat communications units cannot operate without today. Located at Clark Air Base, Philippine Islands, the terminal (AN/TSC-54) had a broad reception and transmission range and was symbiotic with the global nature of the group. In the years to follow, the 3rd would become experts on deployable satellite terminals and employ various types and sizes to provide command and control, and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance capabilities that have become integral to the way the Air Force conducts operations.

During Vietnam, the 3rd assisted the Republic of Vietnam Air Force in developing a command and control system at Tan Son Nhat Air Base and fielded the required communications networks to support it. Called the Tactical Air Control System, the system handled the flow of aircraft from take-off to target area, and return to the base it was launched from, assuring positive control of all areas where significant combat operations were performed. In fact, the TACS facilities were located in close proximity to both the VNAF and USAF forces in South Vietnam, enabling commanders of both to utilize its capabilities. Without this system, it would not have been possible to deploy forces effectively where needed.

After Vietnam, combat communications, and the rest of the Air Force, went through a period of reduced operations and deployments. However, the cold war was still ongoing and the U.S. would once again call upon the 3rd CCG. In 1983, the government of Grenada, with assistance from Cuba and the Soviet Union, established another communist stronghold in the western hemisphere. Following the execution of Grenada's self-proclaimed prime minister, President Ronald Reagan feared that the 1,000 U.S. citizens on the island were in danger and ordered OPERATION URGENT FURY in October 1983. The 3rd Herd rapidly responded and deployed to Grenada, providing satellite and intra-base radio communications to the Airlift Control Center at Point Salines Airport during the rescue operation. Although there were many successes and the support the 3rd CCG provided was stellar, inter-service communications suffered and were highlighted to the U.S. Congress that more attention was needed to improve joint operations in future engagements.

In 1990, the 3rd Herd deployed to the sands of Saudi Arabia and Oman during OPERATIONS DESERT SHIELD and DESERT STORM. The group provided the full range of ATCALS and communications across the theater as the U.S. quickly deployed more than 500,000 Airmen to Southwest Asia. Establishing one of the two major satellite communications hubs in Thumrait, Oman, the 31st Combat Communications Squadron proved critical to ensuring one of the most complex contingency network architectures ever built succeeded in connecting the flying wings to the air operations center and delivering the air tasking order, critical to synchronizing complex air combat operations.

The 3rd CCG's motto is "Anytime, Anywhere" and over the years the group provided support to

numerous humanitarian operations--delivering critical communications and civil engineering when and where its country needed it. Deployments have included support for tornado recovery, hurricane cleanup, the 1980 Mt. Saint Helens volcano eruption, and even avalanche recovery operations in Alaska. Closer to home, the 3rd Herd supported Oklahoma City after the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah federal building when one of their own, Airman 1st Class Cartney McRaven of the 32nd Combat Comm Squadron, lost her life during the tragic terrorist attack. As always, the unit quickly responded and provided critical power, radio, and life support to rescue operations.

One of the most far-reaching humanitarian operations occurred in August 2005, when the 31st Combat Communications Squadron responded for Hurricane Katrina disaster relief operations. In the period immediately following one of the most devastating hurricanes, the 3rd Herd embarked on a grueling 36-hour convoy to New Orleans' Louis Armstrong International Airport. There, the 3rd CCG provided the 4th Air Expeditionary Group with vital command and control communications that enabled the rapid restoration of law and order in New Orleans as well as the rescue and evacuation of hurricane victims.

In 2003, the 3rd Herd comprised some of the first forces into Iraq at the beginning of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM. Hundreds of 3rd Herders provided the initial communications and air traffic control radars immediately following the invasion in 2003, including bases that would become hubs to the long-term operations such as Baghdad International Airport (Camp Sather). Eventually, the 3rd CCG provided a continuous presence through Ali and Kirkuk Airbases to provide predictability, stability and better service during the long-term commitment.

As the 3rd Herd were there at the beginning of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM, it was only fitting that they would be there at the end of OPERATION NEW DAWN. The 3rd CCG, as well as its sister group the 5th CCG, provided "last out" communications to the last remaining air bases in Iraq, providing an orderly transition to the Iraqi government.

Finally, any discussion of the 3rd Herd would be incomplete without mentioning its ever-present mascot. In 1986, Colonel Buford "Randy" Witt was sent to reinvigorate combat communications and move it forward. Among the many improvements he made, one of the most enduring was the new pride and purpose in this very important mission. The 3rd CCG's mascot at the time was an owl and, although proud and wise, it did not reflect the tenacity and toughness required of a combat communicator. In order to shape the culture and improve esprit de corps the mascot was changed to a bull to coincide with the Oklahoma community that the 3rd CCG was part of. In recognition of the leadership that general Witt provided, the bull was named "Buford" and sits prominently in front of the headquarters building. Most importantly, the 3rd CCG took on the nickname of the "Herd" and this is how most people refer to the group today.

This proud group's accomplishments are reflected on its guidon, bending under the weight of 18 combat and unit awards earned over a distinguished history. In addition, the unit produced several general officers from its ranks, such as retired Maj. Gen. Dale Meyerrose, retired Brig. Gen. Buford Witt, retired Brig. Gen. Daniel Dinkins, retired Brig. Gen. David Cotton, Brig. Gen. Gregory Brundidge, the current USEUCOM/J6, and Brig. Gen David Uhrich, the current Air Combat Command Director of Communications.



#### **Emerson P. Whaley**

Emerson P. "Pete" Whaley called last night ... Pete used to be a control tower operator at King One Eight. He arrived there in mid 1952 and I hadn't talked to him face-to-face or on the phone since 1953.

Pete's last email to me was on April 21, 2008. He went "off the air" about the time his wife died. Hadn't heard from him since and then right after Ray Buday called last night ... here comes Pete's call ... a bolt from the blue ... what a pleasant surprise!

Our acquaintance at K-18 ... 59 years ago ... was brief but long enough for him to teach me a few things about my new job. For now let me say that I owe him a lot ... he says I don't ... I think I do. The last time I talked to him over the telephone was also 59 years ago. His advice to me in that phone call, from his tent during my first shift in the tower at K-18, probably saved the lives what was left of an Invader crew ... a midwatch (0000I to 0600I) ... very low ceiling with one engine feathered. The pilot was hit ... as I remember he was dead ... this is bad since the B-26 only carried one pilot ... the navigator in his right seat was driving. Pete advised me to turn on the ceiling light ... a searchlight ... and tell the pilot to spiral down. This advice came after "nav" had missed two approaches. I think the application of power woke up the whole base including Pete since I vaguely remember one phrase from the conversation ... 'we're trying to sleep down here' or something similar.

The wreckage remained relatively intact ... and all but the pilot walked away. The AC&W guys, up on the hill, probably led the plane through the dark to K-18, as they did for many. I wonder if any of the pilots ever tipped their hats to those guys ... they were good ... I kinda suspect they were just taken for granted ... Pete and I talked for a long time ... he told of his 26 years of service ... mostly in the USAF ... two tours in Vietnam ... his life in the country near Nacona, TX ... his dog with which he walks a lot and how he used to fish a lot. He retired in 1975 ... enlisted in 1951 ... had some earlier time in the Guard after he fibbed about his age ... his Guard unit discharged him (under age) when they were ordered to Korea at the start of the war.

He also said at K-18 he spent a lot of time with the USN guys at FASRON-11 ... they had a TBM Avenger ... they called it "The Turkey" and it was flown by a CPO. Pete was invited by the chief to fly up to Wonsan harbor ... an island emergency strip behind enemy lines to pick up a downed pilot. The chief said it was just a milk run. Pete couldn't find Lt. Roy Lane

our detachment commander (DETCO) to obtain permission. Not being able to find Lt. Lane Pete went on the "milk run" to the island anyway.

Unknown to Pete ... the enemy had a huge railroad gun pointed at the strip on the island ... a beach ... when any plane landed they rolled out the gun and fired one round then rolled it back into the tunnel. Our cruisers laid for this gun but as far as I know they never got it.

The Seabees had constructed revetments near the strip and all aircraft were placed in one ... the enemy couldn't tell which one ... a shell game ... everyone took cover until the round was fired and work resumed. Bill Leisher, FASRON-11, filled me in on this. Pete's welcoming "round" hit near the Avenger and peppered it good. Pete told the chief he'd be court-martialed if he missed his upcoming shift in the tower and off they went in a wounded "Turkey". Pete remembers they had gear problems approaching K-18 but got down OK. Bill says he remembered seeing the "battle damage" holes in the airplane.

Pete says he still remembers Lt. Lane's "words" when he learned about this "milk run".

Needless to say we talked a lot ... about K-18 ... our youth and subsequent life.

All-in-all July 17, 2012 was a great day for me ... Pete and Ray called ... Ray's gonna be OK after losing his home to the Colorado Springs forest fire; and Emerson

P. Whaley is back in the fold ... The "Nats" won with a homerun in the bottom of the 11th and my daughter-in-law celebrated her birthday in Ocean City, MD and I remembered it in time to get her a card before she gets back.

After I made my plans to attend AirVenture 2012 (Oshkosh) ... got an invitation from DoD 60th Anniversary of the Korean War Commemoration

Committee. They are having a ceremony at Arlington on July 27th. The purpose is to remember the 59th Anniversary of the signing of the Korean War Armistice ... and our "heroes". I'm flying back home early from Oshkosh and plan to be there. I'll take some pictures and share what I can with you. I'll be

1990 AFCC - 55,659 assigned personnel, which was 6.9% of the AF

#### He Won The Toss?

As time goes by, and it sure does, we would all love to renew some of our old acquaintances. However, time is against us — especially us of World War II. To my wife's dismay, but to my benefit, I happen to be a collector and I saved our AACS Newsletters. So one cold lonely winter's night I started to go over them, and lo and behold, there were a few of my Canton Island buddies. (June 1994 issue). How I missed them I'll never know. They were sent in by Bill Hoffer with no names — I remembered few as indicated.

I arrived on Canton (known as the One Tree Island) in 1943 and spent 14 months listening to Goonie Birds and crabs crawling over the coral. Thank God we had a great bunch of guys there. We had a landing strip, a Direction Finder Station, a point-to-point radio station, Radio Range, etc. I was a radio mechanic. I remember the liner, the President Taylor, went aground there after being chased by submarines. We borrowed the ice reefer off it and built a "Day" room around it. We hooked up copper tubing and a compressor and turned it on and froze every can of beer solid. When I returned to Hickam (we were in the 145th) I was put in charge of the radio shack and had to service our 10 to 12 planes. In one or more of the issues someone discussed an AACS plane crashing. I recall one of ours crashed off of Guam. I cannot forget it because I had to assign the radio operators and two guys wanted the trip because on the way back they were stopping at Suva (a well known R & R). Well, as you realize, the ones who won the toss went down with the plane.

I'd like to hear from some of the 145th, even though our ranks are thinning; there are a few left.

#### AACS B-25 Down Near Rota

A friend of mine, Joe Welch, loaned me his June 1999 AACS Alumni Newsletter. On page 22 an article by Edwin Mallar titled "He Won The Toss" caught my eye.

I was in the 145th AACS Sq as a pilot. Flying a B-25H (a one pilot plane), I took off from Guam bound for Okinawa on 6 April 1945 and went down at sea by the Jap held island of Rota. Lost my navigator, Lt. Miller and radio operator Cpl. Svedik (sp).

Does this have anything to do with Mr. Mallard's article about a 145th Sq plane going down or did another 145th Sq plane, other than mine, go down near Guam?

Your article in the Jume 1999 AACS Newsletter was brought to my attention by Robert Jeffrey's note in the Jume 2000 membetter: "AACS R25 Down Near Rota."

I responded to Mr. Jeffrey's article. My military history includes being the administrative inspector for the 40th Group and 7th AACS Wing. I took many trips with Le Jeffrey in a M25.

You mentioned several points of interest in your "No Non the Thom" article. I too was assigned to the 145th. In early 1944 or late 1943 I was the first sergeant for a brief period. Accept any other duties I would meet all the AACS personnel when they first came to Mickas Field. It was nort of an orientation meeting.

If my memory lan't playing tricks on me, we, the imspection team were on Canton scmetime late in 1944. It was 1944 when AACS moved into the Air Inspector business. We hit every island checking Direction Finders, and oher AACS functions. All trips were by B25.

I was on Gomm when the M25 went down. We lost the radio operator and the mavigator. I can't recall their names.

Although the 145th was a unit of over 1,000 men, I feel that summehere along the NACS trail you and I met. It may have been at Mickem or Canton.

QUESTION: Who or what are we? The AF Communicators & Air Traffic Controllers Association.

ANSWER: An Association that is comprised of approximately 2,000 members who began their service in the Army Air Corps and/or the Signal Corps before WWII and who served in the first dedicated communications element to provide communications and air traffic control as its primary mission and members who have served since then in any communications or air traffic control unit, including those serving today. This new Army Air Corps organization was formed in 1938 and was named the "Army Airways Communications System" (AACS). During WWII, it was renamed the "Air Communications Service" (ACS) and placed under the then "Air Transport Command" and within months was renamed once again as the "Airways and Air Communications Service" (AACS). In 1961, AACS was elevated to a Major Air Command and renamed "Air Force Communications Service" (AFCS). In 1979, the name was changed to Air Force Communications Command" (AFCC). In the early 1990's the Air Force was undergoing major reorganizations and realignment of functions and AFCC was downsized and renamed the "Air Force Command, Control, Communications & Computers Agency" (AFC4A) and shortly thereafter, was renamed the "Air Force Communications Agency" (AFCA). Also in the early 1990's, the Air Force created the "Air Force Flight Standards Agency" (AFFSA), and reassigned air traffic control responsibilities to this new Agency and to the Major Air Commands. In 2009, AFCA was renamed the "Air Force Network Integration Center" (AFNIC) and placed under the AF Space Command along with the newly created 24th Air Force (for Cyber functions). Over the years since the AACS Alumni Association was formed (1977) the membership criteria changed from individuals who only served in AACS units, to include all communicators/information/cyber/air traffic control, maintenance and support skills regardless of what Major or Joint Command an individual served in, including today's active duty personnel. All Honors & awards still reside with AFNIC.
