Executive Director, Ken Reiff, called the meeting to order on Oct 5, 2017, in Oklahoma City, OK.

The following were unable to attend:

Lori Manske, Editor, Print/Online Media, and Rafael Quezada, Protocol

The following guests also attended: Harry Raduege, Rich Griffis, Jim Roberts, and Ken Heitkamp.

- One item previously brought before the Board during the past year was approving a \$200 gift card for recipients of awards. After discussing the benefits recipients and their commanders receive (room and registration, including meals), Hank Sauer moved and Jim Weber seconded a motion to provide each recipient with a tangible gift (ceramic eagle) and an association coin. The motion passed.
- BoD position changes and recommended positions for the coming year:

Executive Director. Ken Reiff is stepping down to allow the election of Harry Raduege as the new Executive Director.

Vice Director. Ray French is stepping down due to personal commitments; Ken Reiff will fill this position.

Secretary. Ed Broestl will continue as Executive Sec-

Sergeant-at-Arms. Due to Bob Read's death, Ray French will assume duties.

Rich Griffis was appointed as Recruiting Committee chairman.

Action: Due to these changes, position descriptions will be reviewed and revised. Estimated completion: Dec 31, 2017

- Treasurer's Report (Jim **Weber):** There is a need to perform a Financial Statement Review whenever new people assume the role of either the Executive Director or Treasurer. Financial Committee will assure this is done within next six months.
- Many items on the Association's equipment inventory list are completely amortized. The

Treasurer will review inventory and revise as needed.

- The Montgomery Chamber of Commerce paid Jim Weber's expenses as he worked with Ken Heitkamp regarding the 2018 Convention.
- The FY 2018 budget was previously sent to BoD and approved by email. There is a slight increase in Web Hosting costs.
- Membership Report (Walt McLain): Income from membership dues is very low. To bolster income, we need to emphasize donations.

There was considerable discussion regarding increasing membership. The lowest membership group is people between ages 30 and 55. This continues to be an area targeted by the Executive Director. We need to advertise our association emphasizing the benefits of membership.

• Executive Director comments:

Adjustments to the BoD structure are helping us work more efficiently and effectively.

We've tightened our budget and financial management in many areas. Our budget process is working well and we are managing our expenses.

Our use of technology has appropriately increased: use of Dropbox to make documents available: responding to requests via our web site Guestbook; and our methodology for electronic voting on matters between conventions are all working well.

- Presentation by 2018 Convention Host (Ken Heitkamp): Slides were presented regarding our 2018 Convention in Montgomery, AL Sept 26-30. After the presentation, Hank Sauer moved to accept the proposal and empower Ken Heitkamp to sign the contract with the Embassy Suites in downtown Montgomery. The motion was seconded by Jim Weber. The motion was approved.
- Rich Griffis presented a Recruiting briefing: There was significant discussion regarding how we make our association relevant to people between 30 and 55. There will be continued conversation via email on this subject.
 - Gerald Prather requested we look for a new Information Officer. While he intends to do whatever is needed to make our association successful, he is not able to give the position the time and energy it deserves. The board thanked him for his contributions to the Air Force and our associa-
 - Editor, Print/Online Media (Lori Manske): There is a need for more articles and stories for upcoming Communicators.

Shared stories reveal faith-inspired leadership

Editor's note: In the June 2017 edition of the Communicator. Ed Broestl introduced the topic of Faith and Leadership. In the article below he reflects on moments during the convention where faith and leadership converged.



Ken Reiff began the "formal" Annual Convention / Reunion activities at a Prayer Breakfast sharing some of his experiences at the intersection of Faith and Leadership using Luke 7:8 & 9 (For I myself

with soldiers under me...I tell you the truth. I have not found such

great faith...). Intriguing, encouraging and heartfelt capture the essence of his remarks.

Yes, 42 years ago Ken Reiff was my commander. Yes, he shared some stories that I remembered. However, he shared some things that I never knew! After breakfast, I shook his hand thanking him and saying: "I had no idea." Others informally shared their experiences at the afore- mentioned intersection. It set the tone for our experience (my wife Diane and I) in Oklahoma City with comrades-in-arms with military experiences spanning the past eight decades.

As unlikely as I thought, the Tinker AFB tour provided a view from our intersection. The tour of AWACS aircraft was especially encouraging. Our guide, an AF TSgt, with AWACS experience and looking forward to being and an instructor: his passion and dedication. The on-board communications maintenance people: their passion for excellence. The weapons controllers: their knowledge, passion and dedication to keeping our pilots safe. The computer maintenance people: their caring not just for the equipment but the people too. The words of St

Paul in Philippians 4:6 (Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.) came to mind.

The evening at the Oklahoma History Museum – a stately place where faith and leadership were ever present. The courage and faith of our fathers and mothers--the shoulders upon which we stand. Hopefully learning and growing from their accomplishments and missteps from Romans 8:28 (We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose.)

From 1965 to 1968 the largest buildup of communications, air traffic control and Aircraft Control and Warning sites during the Vietnam War occurred. Much of

the credit for this effort is due to the determination of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Communications-Electronics, Pacific Air Forces and Commander, Pacific Communications Area (AFCS), Brig Gen Anthony (Tony) Shtogren.

During this assignment, General Shtogren's primary focus was toward the

prosecution of the war in Southeast Asia covering Vietnam, Thailand and classified locations.

Under his leadership, tactical assets were replaced with fixed base equipment, unique capability was established such as Link 14 border warning and airspace deconfliction between the Navy and Air Force pilots, Sky Spot radar targeting, long range altitude reservation throughout the Pacific, and Igloo White electronic to Major General. sensors for targeting.

From a cyber perspective, he strongly pursued link encryption for both fixed and tactical wideband systems to deny the enemy information on air tasking orders.

> In other areas of the Pacific he was responsible for the Japan Kanto Plains Microwave upgrade as well as upgrade of the Korean Blue Fortune microwave system to Peace Fortune. Each of these efforts vastly improved communications in those countries.

He began systematic upgrade of communications and air traffic con-

trol equipment on Okinawa and worked closely with Strategic Air Command to do the same at Guam.

General Shtogren was the first weather officer to command an AFCS communications/air traffic control unit.

His last assignment was in 1968 as the Deputy Director. Office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, J6, where he received his promotion

I need to challenge the 12A as being the first.

When the 4th Fighter Wing moved into Kimpo (Korea), my "control tower" was a jeep with a salvaged SCR522 from a P51.

Shortly, they sent us a 6x6 with a box bed with a nose piece from a B-17 and a trailer with a PE95 diesel generator.

This felt like a factory-made job at the time except it didn't have a clock. My wrist watch, received as a graduation present, was the official time keeper for the Air Base for several months.

As things warmed up the locals built us a unit on top of the old administration building.

Finally, they got around to building us a real tower closer to the runway which was in use when I rotated stateside. There were some interesting times as we moved out and back to Kimpo after the Chinese push.

AACS was a fine group of people and I have fond memories of our efforts. I was actually in the tower at Itazuki the day the war started. We scrambled four F-80s and two F-82s. One of the 82 pilots took a round in the rear going up against the Yak 15s over Seoul. (The Yak-



ovlev Yak-15—NATO code name: 'Feather' aka "Type II"—was, alongside with the MiG-9, the first operational Soviet jet fighter.)

From Japan, I did about 40% of my time TDY to the peninsula before I moved to Kimpo for the remainder of my tour.

I was one of many that were extended on our enlistments by the President.

USAFE bombing story touches reader on personal level

Ken Reiff's article (Bombing of USAFE HQ, November 2016) brought back memories of a time when terrorist attacks like the one at Ramstein AB, Germany were less prevalent. However I took this particular one a little more personally than others.

Brig Gen Joe Moore, assistant deputy chief of staff for operations for USAFE, survived the bombing and went on to a long and full career of over 30 years. After his recovery at Ramstein he became the USAFE deputy chief of staff for operations.

In July 1982 he returned to the U.S. as commander of the Chanute Technical Training Center, Chanute AFB, IL. In August 1985 he transferred to Lowry AFB, CO, where he became the technical training center commander there.

In October 1986 I arrived at Lowry as a captain and air traffic control officer assigned to the 1978th Comm Squadron. By coincidence, it was the same month that General Moore, whom I never got to meet, retired.

It turned out that I got a second chance. Months later the comm squadron hosted an orientation for a new civilian communications-electronics officer hire from the AF Accounting and Finance Center which was also on Lowry.

As chief of air traffic control operations at nearby Buckley Air National Guard Base I was tasked to host a visit to the control tower there.

I was pleasantly surprised when that C-E officer turned out to be a Miss rather than a Mister. By all accounts the tower visit was a resounding success. I've been married to that C-E officer, Elizabeth, for over 26 years. It was a regular storybook communicator's romance.

As a bonus she turned out to be General Moore's only daughter. I subsequently got to meet and know General Moore and his wife, Beverly,

up close and personal over the years.



The Ramstein bombing wasn't his first brush with death. As an F-4 fighter pilot he flew with Robin Olds' 8th Tactical Fighter Wing "Wolf Pack." One of his 135 combat missions ended prematurely when he was shot down over North Vietnam. Luckily he was snatched out of the jungle by a Jolly Green helicopter crew shortly after he bailed out.

He was also the Air Force Thunderbirds aerial demonstration squadron's commander-leader, deftly flying Thunderbird #1 at air shows at various locations. He led their conversion from F-100s to F-4s, the most extensive in the team's history.

His full and active life ended too early when he was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's disease and subsequently passed away at his home in Niceville, FL, in 2001. It was a tough way for a fighter pilot to punch out but he was a real trooper right up to the end. He fought the good fight!

How old was the Air Force when you joined?

AACS in 1947

The year 1947 was a momentous one for AACS and the entire Air Force. The passage of the National Security Act on 18 Sept 1947 made a reality the long-sought goal of a separate Air Force equal with the Army and Navy. AACS remained an essential service of the newly formed Air Force, but a number of administrative changes followed. AACS moved its headquarters a few miles from Gravelly Point, VA, to Washington National Airport, to Andrews MD, where its parent headquarters, the Military Air Transport Service, was located. At the same time all the AACS wings, groups, squadrons, and detachments were changed from one- and three digit designations to the 1800 and 1900 series. For example, the 7th AACS Wing and 68th AACS Group, both in Tokyo, became the 1808th AACS Wing and the 1809th AACS Group, respectively.

The Army Airways Communications System was first organized on Nov. 15 1938, in the Directorate of Communications of the U.S. Army Air Corps. On April 13, 1943, the official lineage of the Army Airways Communications System as a separate organization began with the constitution of the Army Airways Communications System Wing. The Wing was activated as part of the Flight Control Command on April 26, 1943.

On July 14, 1943, the Wing was reassigned directly to the Army Air Forces. It was redesignated the Army Airways Communications Service, the Wing designator was dropped, on April 26, 1944. On March 13, 1946, the Army Airways Communications Service was redesignated the Air Communications Service and reassigned to Air Transport Command. Air Communications Service was redesignated Airways and Air Communications Service Sept. 11, 1946. Airways and Air Communications Service was reassigned to the Military Air Transport Service June 1, 1948.

Veteran ID Card coming soon

The Veterans Identification Card Act 2015 (Public Law 114-31) was enacted on July 20, 2015. The card serves as proof of service in the Armed Forces, which can be used to obtain discounts on goods and services offered to Veterans. The VIC does not qualify Veterans for additional benefits administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs and does not serve as proof for any benefits to which you may be entitled. Also, the VIC will not grant access to military posts or installations.

VA began accepting applications for the VIC Nov 1, 2017. For those who wish to obtain a VIC, Veterans should log into Vets.gov to apply. If eligible, you will receive your ID card (at no cost to you) in the mail within 3 weeks. For more information please go to:

Meanwhile, the Department of Veterans Affairs continues to provide a Veterans Health Identification Card (VHIC) for veterans to use at VA medical facilities. The VHIC will be issued only to veterans who are eligible for VA medical benefits and only for the purpose of identification and check-in for VA medical appointments.

50 years of CMSAF

NATIONAL HARBOR, MD (AFNS)--The 50th anniversary of the chief master sergeant of the Air Force was celebrated during the Air Force Association Air, Space and Cyber Conference Sept. 20, 2017.

Four former CMSAFs: Eric Benken, Frederick "Jim" Finch, Gerald Murray and James Roy, discussed topics about history, mentorship and balancing healthy work and life.

There was a 20-year span between establishment of the Air Force in 1947 and the CMSAF position in 1967. The position was created to allow enlisted personnel to freely express opinions and share recommendations on matters ranging from mission effectiveness to personnel concerns.

The former Chiefs paid homage to the first CMSAF Paul Airey, a World War II airborne radio operator who was shot down in Germany, and served as a prisoner of war. He dedicated his 27-year career to taking care of Airmen. In 1967, he was named the first CMSAF. "He absolutely set the example for all of us," said Murray. "We all had the opportunity to live under his tutelage as he continued to serve...until the day he died. We could not have [had] anyone set a better example for us."

ATC Facility of Year

CHARLOTTE, NC – The 235th Air Traffic Control Squadron of the North Carolina Air National Guard was announced as the 2016 D. Ray Hardin Air Traffic Control Facility of the Year. The award is given for professionalism and exceeding superior standards and expectations; for the Airmen of the unit it is the culmination of years of hard work.

The 235th Air Traffic Control Squadron is one of three radar units in the ANG whose mission is supporting C-130 Hercules operations while training air traffic controllers to deploy around the globe.

In past years, Airmen of the 235th Air Traffic Control Squadron didn't have a radar and needed to rely on other airports to know when aircraft were inbound—a handicap that made them ineligible for award nomination

With the activation of the radar in 2016, the 235th Air Traffic Control Squadron acquired 800 square miles of airspace from three Federal Aviation approach controls, constructed five airspace maps, provided air traffic control services to four county airports, directed movement of aircraft along seven civil airways and five tactical military routes, and even won the Earl F. Ward award, an international accolade for enhancing quality, safety, and efficiency of air traffic control.

Disability claims

VA unveils claims initiative that promises faster decisions

WASHINGTON — As part of the Department of Veterans Affairs' efforts to improve timeliness of services for Veterans and their families, VA unveiled the Decision Ready Claims (DRC) initiative, a disability claims submission option with accredited Veterans Service Organizations (VSO) that promises faster claims decisions.

Veterans who choose to submit their claim under DRC can expect to receive a decision within 30 days from the time VA receives the claim. VSOs will ensure all supporting evidence—medical exams, military service records, etc.—is included with the claim submission. This preparation by the VSOs allows claims to be assigned immediately to claims processors for a quick decision.

DRC was first implemented May 1, 2017, at the St. Paul (Minn.) Regional Office, and is now available at all VA regional offices. While DRC is currently limited to claims for in-

creased compensation (commonly known as claims for increase), and requires Veterans to work with VSOs, VA's goal is to expand the types of claims accepted under the initiative and allow Veterans other ways to submit their claim under DRC

DRC is another step in modernizing VA's benefits delivery to Veterans in a fully digital operating environment.

Milestone changes coming to TRICARE

FALLS CHURCH, VA (AFNS) -TRICARE beneficiaries will soon have increased access to health care through key changes set to take place in January 2018. Beneficiaries will be able to take command of their health care through expanded choices. Improvements include wider access to network providers, updated enrollment to reduce disruptions in care and simplified co-payments.

Beneficiaries can visit the TRICARE Changes page, where they can sign up for email alerts, complete a beneficiary checklist, and see available plans and 2018 costs.

20th OSS Airmen prepare for merger

SHAW AFB, S.C. -- Airmen assigned to the 20th Operations Support Squadron are preparing for an Air Force Specialty Code merger scheduled for March 2018.

Currently separated into two shops, ground radar systems and airfield systems Airmen have begun working together to meet training milestones and increase their understanding of the work their coworkers do.

The Airmen will also be aligned with their industry counterparts who perform all ground radar and airfield systems tasks under one career field.

Once the merger is complete, all technicians will be expected to have a working knowledge of how to maintain the equipment each section was previously responsible for. This includes all ground-to-air communications, navigation and weather systems, as well as the radars air traffic controllers use to guide aircraft.

The Airmen developed a training strategy by learning from past experiences such as the merge of the ground radio and meteorological navigation career fields, said SSgt Rajiv Shetty, 20th OSS ground radar systems NCOIC. The plan outlined milestones and deadlines each team member should reach as well as solutions for potential issues.

If a technician from either shop is called out to perform a task, their counterpart will accompany for on-the-job training, said A1C Darricka Sides, 20th OSS airfield systems technician. This process of teaching others also helps Sides learn more and become more proficient in her job.

Formal training is available at Keesler AFB, MS.

Base Information Transport Infrastructure

Wired infrastructure for 104 installations complete


The Base Information Transport Infrastructure program, which provides wired and wireless network capabilities to active-duty, Reserve and Air National Guard bases worldwide, achieved full deployment status for 104 wired networks Sept. 29.

Full deployment is the last milestone, declaring the product is completed. Full deployment for this

program is similar to weapons systems reaching full operational capability.

According to program officials, the milestone marks the completion of wired network infrastructure installations for 77 stand-alone ANG locations and 27 active duty, Air Force Reserve, and co-located units. The total procurement value of this effort was approximately \$1.4 billion.

The upgrade includes a distribution system element, such as fiber optics, a manhole and duct system; an inside plant element consisting of



power, ground, cooling and physical security; and a network element, which includes switches for distribution and user access.

"The BITI team takes pride in achieving full deployment," said Andy Manvell, BITI program manager. "As the program transitions to sustainment, we have many challenges ahead. We will perform our ongoing recapitalization mission to ensure our network's reliability and availability."

Recapitalization will replace hardware, such as core and critical distribution nodes, every five years. The five-year update is in alignment with industry standards for commercial-off-the-shelf refresh cycles on BITI-related network components.

According to Lt. Col. Bradley Panton, the BITI materiel leader, the refresh cycle will drive out obsolete equipment, which could otherwise introduce vulnerabilities to the network. Panton also noted that the BITI Program's network management system effort will standardize network

operations across the Air Force, saving the Air Force millions in the future and enabling seamless mobilization of network operators.

BITI began in the 1990s under the name of Combat Information Transport System program. Initially established for connectivity of all core facilities deemed mission essential, it expanded to provide base-wide, wired and wireless connectivity to base network users as well as a GuestNet capability and a standardized network management system.

Charles A. Green enlisted

in the Army in February 1942, assigned to the US Army Chemical Warfare Service. He transferred to the Air Corps as an aviation cadet (Communications), commissioned as a 2nd lieutenant in October 1942, and assigned to the Army Airways Communications Service. He was assigned to Alaska where he served as AACS detachment commander at Naknek, Elmendorf, and Attu, as AACS Aleutian Squadron commander, and then as 59th AACS Group Operations and executive officer, and then commander of the 1804th AACS Independent Group, responsible for airways operations from Edmonton, Alberta to Attu at the end of the Aleutian chain.

After the war, he also had operational responsibility for the air bases

at Kiska, Port Heiden, Barter Island, Atka, and St Paul Island in the Pribilofs.

In October 1948, after nearly six years in Alaska, he was transferred to AACS Headquarters at Andrews AFB, where he was deputy director of operations until late 1951. He was selected for an assignment with USAFIT, where he entered an 18 month program with companies that constituted the National Communications Resource. This program was aimed at providing depth of knowledge to avoid mistakes made during WWII.

In the spring of 1953 he went to SAC headquarters as deputy chief of the C&E division under Maj Gen John Bestic. Much time was spent organizing a "future systems" shop to chart the course of SAC communications.

During 1958 he returned stateside to the newly formed SAC Systems Office and reported to Lt Gen Gordon Gould at SAC headquarters and was responsible for the integration of SAC C&E requirements into the development of Ballistic Missile and Space Systems.


He retired September 1962 and joined Collins Radio where he was involved in VLF programs, both ground and airborne, NASA VLA and space tracking/communication systems. He retired again in late 1970 and he and his wife spent years aboard their sailboat. They moved ashore in late 1980 and in 1990 moved to Air Force Village. He died in 1999 and is interred in Fort Sam Houston Cemetery, San Antonio.




< Probably Station WZX Elmendorf, 1944 or 1946

SCS-51 (early ILS), 1944 Aleutians





Mini crypto chip ready for production



By Benjamin Newell 66th Air Base Group HANSCOM AFB, MA -- The Air Force's new Mini Crypto chip will secure communications and data between systems like unmanned aerial vehicles and explosive ordnance disposal robots, while being "losable."

Airmen in the field rely on secured communications to accomplish their missions without enemy knowledge of their plans. Historically, the means by which the military encrypts its communications has been

cumbersome and subject to interception, like when Allies successfully stole a Nazi encryption device, called an enigma machine, during World War II.

"We think (Mini Crypto an Enchip) will really help forwarddeployed war-fighters secure sensors, or communications devices, in areas where risk of interception is high, and still protect sensitive data, without burdening folks on the front lines with extra equipment or steps to safeguard the encryption device," said Heidi Beason, the Mini Crypto program manager at the Air Force Life Cycle Management Center, Cryptologic and Cyber System Division, Joint Base-San Antonio, TX.

Mini Crypto is a self-contained encryption engine that generates its own session-based "key." Designed

to be small and lightweight, it is about the size of a cracker. Its power requirement is roughly the same as a hearing aid, at 400 milliwatts, meaning it can be installed on equipment carried by one-person parties operating as scouts and forward air controllers.

"Mini Crypto is the result of two years of program development for us," she said. "We took a requirement for a very small, low-power encryption device and in less than 20 months successfully designed and tested this unique component. Now we're ready for production."

...the means by which the military encrypts its communications has been cumbersome and subject to interception, like when Allies successfully stole a Nazi encryption device, called an Enigma machine, during World War II.

Beason leads a team of nine at JB San Antonio, who fall under AFLC-MC's Command, Control, Communications, Intelligence and Networks Directorate, Hanscom AFB.

"Communications devices all have a processor, where a message is formatted for transmission," said Christopher Edsall, the Mini Crypto deputy program manager. "In the case of a computer, it's the (central processing unit). Mini Crypto is located after the processing center, but before the transmission center, which is usually a radio. Another Mini Crypto chip is installed at the receiver end, after the receiving antenna, but before the CPU. The second Mini Crypto chip decrypts the received message as it comes through the radio where the unencrypted message is processed, and then it is displayed or heard."

Mini Crypto works by establishing a key between sender and receiver. The exact key is required to read a message after encryption. Mini Crypto's unique key management system protects up to secret data and meets the National Security Agency standards, the highest stan-

dards for encryption.
According to Edsall,
Mini Crypto's encryption makes the effort of
decrypting a message by
an adversary difficult
and resource-intensive.
By the time a message


is readable by an adversary after it is encrypted, it is no longer useful information.

It can be used in joint and coalition environments, providing tailored access to data.

"Mini Crypto's portability and losability make it ideal for things like precision air drops of supplies," said Beason. "We think this will allow commanders to send combat material to austere locations for pickup, and protect their exact location, without putting the troops who need the material at risk."

any in this association saw air traffic control take a technological leap forward with the introduction of radar in the 1950s. Some saw air and ground radio stations transform from continuous wave Morse Code to radio telephone. Many witnessed the advent of the computer. They all helped the military increase the quantity and quality of communications, data automation, and air traffic controls systems to meet changing needs.

Formerly called AACS Alumni Association (1977 to 2008), AACS stood for both the Army Airways Communications System and the Airways and Air Communications Service. Because missions were basically the same, the AACS Alumni Association expanded membership to include AFCS, AF Communications Command, AF Command, Control, Communications & Computer Agency, AF Communications Agency, AF Flight Standards Agency, and other major commands up to and including today's organizational structure.

TAX STATUS

The AF Communicators and Air Traffic Controllers Association is an **IRS Code 501(c)(19)** organization. Donations to the Association are tax deductible when filing IRS Form 1040.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION HISTORY

The AACS Alumni Association was formed on Sept. 30, 1977. Larry and Doris Camp were visiting Dux and Pearl LeDoux in Eunice, LA in 1976 when the subject of old military friends came up. Larry and Dux were assigned to the 5th AACS Wing in Europe. What began as an invite to a poker weekend in Columbus, OH (Larry and Dux were part of a London, England, poker group for AACS detachment commanders) to be hosted by the Camps, turned out to be the first annual reunion.

The couples contacted old friends, who in turn contacted others, and so on. A large number of

former AACS troops and spouses made their way to Columbus and the result was what is now one of the strongest AF Alumni Associations. AACS Alumni Association was adopted as the official title, derived from Army Airways Communications System and Airways and Air Communications Service.

Individuals who were part of the first reunion had been assigned to AACS units before, during and after World War II, the Korean Conflict, and up to 1961 when AACS became a MAJCOM and was renamed the AF Communications Service (AFCS).

An annual convention is held in different cities each year. They usually begin on the last Thursday of September and end the following Sunday. The Association operates on membership dues and donations. Association dues are minimal, \$15 per year, payable in two-year increments of \$30.

ABOUT AACS

In 1938 the Army Airways Communications System (AACS) was formed. During World War II, for a short time it was renamed the Army Airways Communications Wing and then the Air Communications Service, but that only lasted 9 months. When the clamor reached the halls of the Pentagon to retain the AACS designation, it was renamed the Airways and Air Communications Service (AACS) in 1946. This new designation was also a better fit due to the high volume of airplanes flying through U.S. and U.S.-controlled airspace and the need to control airways.

In 1961 AACS was elevated to Major Air Command status and it was renamed the Air Force Communications Service (AFCS).

This designation remained until 1979 when it was renamed the Air Force Communications Command (AFCC). The old blue original AACS logo is our official Association logo.
